4 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—The  
5 WIIN Act (Public Law 114–322) is amended—

6 (1) in section 4007 (43 U.S.C. 390(b) note)—

7 (A) in subsection (h)(1)—

8 (i) by striking “\$335,000,000 of fund-  
9 ing in section 4011(e) is authorized” and  
10 inserting “\$134,000,000 is authorized”;  
11 and

12 (ii) by striking “to remain available  
13 until expended” and inserting “to be ap-  
14 propriated for each of fiscal years 2021  
15 through 2025 to carry out this section”;  
16 and

17 (B) in subsection (h)(2)—

18 (i) by striking “Congress.” and insert-  
19 ing “Congress; and”; and

20 (ii) by adding at the end the fol-  
21 lowing:

22 “(A) After approval by Congress of an ini-

8 tion 1602(g) of the Reclamation Wastewater and Ground-  
9 water Study and Facilities Act (title XVI of Public Law  
10 102–575; 43 U.S.C. 390h(g)), as amended by section

12 “\$50,000,000 to remain available until expended” and in-  
13 serting “\$20,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2021  
14 through 2025”.

15 (e) CALFED AUTHORIZATION.—Title I of Public Law  
16 108–361 (the Calfed Bay-Delta Authorization Act) (118  
17 Stat. 1681; 123 Stat. 2860; 128 Stat. 164; 128 Stat.  
18 2312) (as amended by section 4007(k) of the WIIN Act  
19 (130 Stat. 1866)) is amended by striking “2019” each  
20 place it appears and inserting “2025”.

21 (f) BLUEPRINT PARTICIPATION.—Section 4009 of  
22 the WIIN Act (Public Law 114–322) is amended by add-  
23 ing after subsection (a) the following:

24 “(b) AUTHORIZATION TO PARTICIPATE.—The Sec-  
25 retary of the Interior is authorized to participate in the

1 development of the Water Blueprint for the San Joaquin  
2 Valley, including the development of policy and infrastruc-  
3 ture recommendations that— —

4 “(1) increase surface water availability and reli-  
5 ability; and

6 “(2) reduce groundwater overdraft.”.

7 (g) STORAGE PROJECT FEASIBILITY.—Section  
8 4007(a) of the WIIN Act (43 U.S.C. 390b(a)) is amended  
9 by adding at the end the following:

10 “(3) FEASIBLE.—The term ‘feasible’ in regards  
11 to any Federally owned storage project or State-led  
12 storage project, means any such project for which  
13 the Secretary of the Interior determines that—

14 “(A) engineering and cost estimates have  
15 been completed consistent with the level of de-  
16 tail required for typical feasibility studies used  
17 to assist in the selection of a preferred plan or  
18 alternative in order to ensure the project is con-  
19 structible and estimated costs support feasi-  
20 bility;

21 “(B) there is reasonable certainty that en-  
22 vironmental compliance and permitting, con-  
23 sistent with applicable Federal and State laws,  
24 shall be completed and any potential changes to

1 the project that may be required by those laws  
2 have been identified; and

3 “(C) the maximum amount of Federal  
4 funds provided is no less than the projected  
5 Federal benefits, including, but not limited to,  
6 water supply, irrigation, flood control, hydro-  
7 electric power, navigation, recreation, fish and  
8 wildlife enhancement, water quality, or road im-  
9 provement, maintenance, or relocation provided  
10 by the project.”.

11 (h) STORAGE PROJECT FLEXIBILITY.—Section  
12 4007(b)(1) of the WIIN Act (Public Law 114–322) is  
13 amended by striking “or any public agency” and inserting  
14 “any public agency, or any other entity”.

21 Section 3402 of the Central Valley Project Improve-  
22 ment Act (106 Stat. 4706) is amended—

23 (1) in subsection (f), by striking the period at  
24 the end; and

25 (2) by adding at the end the following:



1 “(g) to ensure that water dedicated to fish and wild-  
2 life purposes by this title is replaced and provided to Cen-  
3 tral Valley Project water contractors by December 31,  
4 2023, at the lowest cost reasonably achievable; and

5 “(h) to facilitate and expedite water transfers in ac-  
6 cordance with this Act.”.

7 **SEC. 2002. AMENDMENT TO DEFINITION.**

8 Section 3403 of the Central Valley Project Improve-  
9 ment Act (106 Stat. 4707) is amended—

10 (1) by amending subsection (a) to read as fol-  
11 lows:

12 “(a) the term ‘anadromous fish’ means those native  
13 stocks of salmon (including steelhead) and sturgeon that,  
14 as of October 30, 1992, were present in the Sacramento  
15 and San Joaquin Rivers and their tributaries and ascend  
16 those rivers and their tributaries to reproduce after matur-  
17 ing in San Francisco Bay or the Pacific Ocean;”;

18 (2) in subsection (h), by striking “(h) The term  
19 ‘natural production’ means fish produced to adult-  
20 hood without direct human intervention in the  
21 spawning, rearing, or migration processes;” and by  
22 redesignating subsections (i) through (m) as sub-  
23 sections (h) through (l), respectively;

24 (3) in subsection (k), by striking “and,” after  
25 “this title”;

1 (4) in subsection (l), by striking the period and  
2 inserting “; and”; and

3 (5) by adding at the end the following:

4 “(m) the term ‘reasonable flows’ means water flows  
5 capable of being maintained taking into account com-  
6 peting consumptive uses of water and economic, environ-  
7 mental, and social factors.”.

8 **SEC. 2003. CONTRACTS.**

9 Section 3404 of the Central Valley Project Improve-  
10 ment Act (106 Stat. 4708) is amended—

11 (1) in the heading, by striking “**LIMITATION**  
12 **ON CONTRACTING AND CONTRACT REFORM**”  
13 and inserting “**CONTRACTS**”; and

14 (2) by striking the language of the section and  
15 by adding:

16 “(a) **RENEWAL OF EXISTING LONG-TERM CON-**  
17 **TRACTS.**—Upon request of the contractor, the Secretary  
18 shall renew any existing long-term repayment or water  
19 service contract that provides for the delivery of water  
20 from the Central Valley Project for a period of 40 years.  
21 In renewing the contract, the Secretary shall not have dis-  
22 cretion to reduce the quantity of water to be delivered  
23 under the contract.

24 “(b) **ADMINISTRATION OF CONTRACTS.**—Except as  
25 expressly provided by this Act, any existing long-term re-

1 payment or water service contract for the delivery of water  
2 from the Central Valley Project shall be administered pur-  
3 suant to the Reclamation laws applicable to the contract,  
4 including the Act of July 2, 1956 (70 Stat. 483) , when  
5 applicable.

6 “(c) PRICING BASED ON WATER DELIVERIES.—Be-  
7 ginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-  
8 retary shall charge contractors only for water actually de-  
9 livered. The Secretary shall incorporate this term in all  
10 contracts for the delivery of water from the Central Valley  
11 Project.”.

12 **SEC. 2004. WATER TRANSFERS, IMPROVED WATER MANAGE-**  
13 **MENT, AND CONSERVATION.**

14 Section 3405 of the Central Valley Project Improve-  
15 ment Act (106 Stat. 4709) is amended as follows:

16 (1) In subsection (a)—

17 (A) by inserting before “Except as pro-  
18 vided herein” the following: “The Secretary  
19 shall take all necessary actions to facilitate and  
20 expedite transfers of Central Valley Project  
21 water in accordance with this Act or any other  
22 provision of Federal Reclamation laws and the  
23 National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.”;

24 (B) in paragraph (1)(A), by striking “to  
25 combination” and inserting “or combination”;

1 (C) in paragraph (2), by adding at the end  
2 the following:

3 “(E) The contracting district from which  
4 the water is coming, the agency, or the Sec-  
5 retary shall determine if a written transfer pro-  
6 posal is complete within 45 days after the date  
7 of submission of such proposal. If such district  
8 or agency or the Secretary determines that such  
9 proposal is incomplete, such district or agency  
10 or the Secretary shall state with specificity  
11 what must be added to or revised in order for  
12 such proposal to be complete.

13 “(F) Except as provided in this section,  
14 the Secretary shall not impose mitigation or  
15 other requirements on a proposed transfer, but  
16 the contracting district from which the water is  
17 coming or the agency shall retain all authority  
18 under State law to approve or condition a pro-  
19 posed transfer.”; and

20 (D) by adding at the end the following:

21 “(4) Notwithstanding any other provision of  
22 Federal Reclamation laws—

23 “(A) the authority to make transfers or ex-  
24 changes of, or banking or recharge arrange-  
25 ments using, Central Valley Project water that

1           could have been conducted before October 30,  
2           1992, is valid, and such transfers, exchanges,  
3           or arrangements shall not be subject to, limited,  
4           or conditioned by this title; and

5           “(B) this title shall not supersede or re-  
6           voke the authority to transfer, exchange, bank,  
7           or recharge Central Valley Project water that  
8           existed prior to October 30, 1992.”.

9           (2) In subsection (b)—

10           (A) in the heading, by striking “METER-  
11           ING” and inserting “MEASUREMENT”; and

12           (B) by inserting after the first sentence  
13           the following: “The contracting district or agen-  
14           cy shall ensure that all surface water delivery  
15           systems owned or operated by that contracting  
16           district or agency within its boundaries measure  
17           surface water at the district or agency’s facili-  
18           ties up to the point the surface water is com-  
19           mingled with other water supplies.”.

20           (3) By striking subsection (d).

21           (4) By redesignating subsections (e) and (f) as  
22           subsections (d) and (e), respectively.

23           (5) By amending subsection (e)(as redesignated  
24           by paragraph (4))—

1 (A) by striking “as a result of the in-  
2 creased repayment” and inserting “that exceed  
3 the cost-of-service”;

4 (B) by inserting “the delivery of” after  
5 “rates applicable to”;

6 (C) by striking “, and all increased reve-  
7 nues received by the Secretary as a result of the  
8 increased water prices established under sub-  
9 section 3405(d) of this section,” ; and

10 (D) by striking “covered” and inserting  
11 “deposited”.

12 **SEC. 2005. FISH, WILDLIFE, AND HABITAT RESTORATION.**

13 Section 3406 of the Central Valley Project Improve-  
14 ment Act (106 Stat. 4714) is amended as follows:

15 (1) In subsection (a) by striking paragraphs (1)  
16 and (2), and redesignating paragraphs (3) and (4)  
17 as (1) and (2);

18 (2) In subsection (b)—

19 (A) by striking “establishing” and insert-  
20 ing “that establish”; and

21 (B) by inserting “, that the Secretary has  
22 determined are not inconsistent with the con-  
23 gressionally authorized purposes of the  
24 project,” after “ California State Water Re-  
25 sources Control Board”;

1 (C) in paragraph (1)—

2 (i) by striking “natural production  
3 of”;

4 (ii) by striking “levels not less than  
5 twice”; and

6 (iii) by striking “title; And provided  
7 further,” and all that follows through the  
8 period and inserting “title.”;

9 (D) in paragraph (1)(B)—

10 (i) by striking “is authorized and di-  
11 rected to” and inserting “may”;

12 (ii) by inserting “reasonable water”  
13 after “to provide”;

14 (iii) by striking “anadromous fish, ex-  
15 cept that such” and inserting “anad-  
16 romous fish. Such”;

17 (iv) by striking “remaining contrac-  
18 tual obligations” and inserting “contrac-  
19 tual obligations”;

20 (v) by striking “Instream flow” and  
21 inserting “Reasonable instream flow”;

22 (vi) by inserting “and the National  
23 Marine Fisheries Service” after “United  
24 States Fish and Wildlife Service”; and

1 (vii) by striking “after consultation  
2 with the California Department of Fish  
3 and Game”;

4 (C) in paragraph (2)—

5 (i) by striking “primary purpose” and  
6 inserting “purposes”;

7 (ii) by striking “but not limited to”  
8 before “additional obligations”; and

9 (iii) by adding after the period the fol-  
10 lowing: “All Central Valley Project water  
11 used for the purposes specified in this  
12 paragraph shall be credited to the quantity  
13 of Central Valley Project yield dedicated  
14 and managed under this paragraph by de-  
15 termining how the dedication and manage-  
16 ment of such water would affect the deliv-  
17 ery capability of the Central Valley Project  
18 during the 1928 to 1934 drought period  
19 after fishery, water quality, and other flow  
20 and operational requirements imposed by  
21 terms and conditions existing in licenses,  
22 permits, and other agreements pertaining  
23 to the Central Valley Project under appli-  
24 cable State or Federal law existing on Oc-  
25 tober 30, 1992, have been met. To the full-



1 est extent possible and in accordance with  
2 section 3411, Central Valley Project water  
3 dedicated and managed pursuant to this  
4 paragraph shall be reused to fulfill the  
5 Secretary's contractual obligations to pro-  
6 vide Central Valley Project water for agri-  
7 cultural or municipal and industrial pur-  
8 poses.”;

9 (D) by amending paragraph (2)(B) to  
10 read:

11 “(B) Such quantity of water shall be man-  
12 aged by the Bureau of Reclamation after con-  
13 sultation with the United States Fish and Wild-  
14 life Service and the National Marine Fisheries  
15 Service.”;

16 (E) by amending paragraph 2(C) to read:

17 “(C) If by March 15th of any year the  
18 quantity of Central Valley Project water fore-  
19 casted to be made available to water service or  
20 repayment contractors in the Delta Division of  
21 the Central Valley Project is below 75 percent  
22 of the total quantity of water to be made avail-  
23 able under said contracts, the quantity of Cen-  
24 tral Valley Project yield dedicated and managed

1           for that year under this paragraph shall be re-  
2           duced by 25 percent.”.

3           (3) In subsection (c) in paragraph (1) by strik-  
4           ing “naturally reproducing”.

5           (2) In subsection (d)—

6                 (A) in paragraph (1), by striking “para-  
7                 graph (1) of this subsection” and inserting  
8                 “paragraph (2) of this subsection”.

9                 (B) by amending paragraph (4) to read as  
10                follows:

11                “(4) If by March 15th of any year the quantity  
12                of Central Valley Project water forecasted to be  
13                made available to water service or repayment con-  
14                tractors in the Delta Division of the Central Valley  
15                Project is below 75 percent of the total quantity of  
16                water to be made available under said contracts, the  
17                quantity of water dedicated under paragraph (1) of  
18                this subsection shall be reduced by 25 percent.”.

19           (4) In subsection (e)—

20                 (A) in paragraph (2), by striking “*Pro-*  
21                 *vided*, That additional hatchery production shall  
22                 only be used to supplement or to re-establish  
23                 natural production while avoiding adverse ef-  
24                 fects on remaining wild stocks;”; and

1 (B) in paragraph (6), by striking “restore,  
2 and enhance natural production of salmon and  
3 steelhead trout” and inserting “and restore  
4 anadromous fish”.

5 (4) By adding at the end the following:

6 “(i) **NATURAL AND ARTIFICIAL PRODUCTION OF**  
7 **SPECIES.**—Regardless of the date of listing, the Secre-  
8 taries of the Interior and Commerce shall not distinguish  
9 between natural production and artificial propagation or  
10 artificial production strains of a species in making any de-  
11 termination under the Endangered Species Act of 1973  
12 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) that relates to any anadromous  
13 fish species present in the Sacramento and San Joaquin  
14 Rivers or their tributaries and ascend those rivers and  
15 their tributaries to reproduce after maturing in San Fran-  
16 cisco Bay or the Pacific Ocean.

17 “(j) **SATISFACTION OF PURPOSES.**—By pursuing the  
18 activities described in this section, the Secretary shall be  
19 deemed to have met the fish and wildlife mitigation, pro-  
20 tection, restoration, and enhancement purposes of this  
21 title.”.

22 **SEC. 2006. RESTORATION FUND.**

23 (a) **IN GENERAL.**—Section 3407(a) of the Central  
24 Valley Project Improvement Act (106 Stat. 4726) is  
25 amended as follows:

1           (1) By inserting “(1) IN GENERAL.—There is  
2 hereby”.

3           (2) By striking “Not less than 67 percent” and  
4 all that follows through “Monies” and inserting  
5 “Monies”.

6           (3) By adding at the end the following:

7           “(2) PROHIBITIONS.—The Secretary may not  
8 directly or indirectly require a donation or other  
9 payment to the Restoration Fund—

10                   “(A) or environmental restoration or miti-  
11 gation fees not otherwise provided by law, as a  
12 condition to—

13                           “(i) providing for the storage or con-  
14 veyance of non-Central Valley Project  
15 water pursuant to Federal reclamation  
16 laws; or

17                           “(ii) the delivery of water pursuant to  
18 section 215 of the Reclamation Reform Act  
19 of 1982 (Public Law 97–293; 96 Stat.  
20 1270); or

21                   “(B) for any water that is delivered with  
22 the intent of groundwater recharge or bank-  
23 ing.”.

24           (b) CERTAIN PAYMENTS.—Section 3407(c)(1) of the  
25 Central Valley Project Improvement Act is amended—

1 (1) by striking “provided for or”; and

2 (2) by striking “of fish, wildlife” and all that  
3 follows through the period and inserting “of carrying  
4 out all activities described in this title.”.

6 AND RESTORATION PAYMENTS.—Section 3407(d)(2)(A)  
7 of the Central Valley Project Improvement Act is amended  
8 by inserting “, or after October 1, 2013, \$4 per megawatt-  
9 hour for Central Valley Project power sold to power con-  
10 tractors (October 2013 price levels)” after “\$12 per acre-  
11 foot (October 1992 price levels) for municipal and indus-  
12 trial water sold and delivered by the Central Valley  
13 Project”.

14 (d) COMPLETION OF ACTIONS.—Section  
15 3407(d)(2)(A) of the Central Valley Project Improvement  
16 Act is amended by inserting “not later than December 31,  
17 2025,” after “That upon the completion of the fish, wild-

16 “(3) ADMINISTRATION.—With the consent of  
17 the appropriate agency head, the Advisory Board  
18 may use the facilities and services of any Federal  
19 agency.”.

6 grantee that will be reduced as a result of the  
7 project.

8 “(c) RURAL COMMUNITY.—In this section, the term  
9 ‘rural community’ does not include—

11 lation in excess of 10,000 inhabitants according to

1 **TITLE V—BUREAU OF RECLAMA-**  
2 **TION AND BUREAU OF INDIAN**  
3 **AFFAIRS WATER PROJECT**  
4 **STREAMLINING ACT**

5 **SEC. 5001. DEFINITIONS.**

6 In this title:

7 (1) ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT.—

8 The term “environmental impact statement” means  
9 the detailed statement of environmental impacts of  
10 a project required to be prepared pursuant to the  
11 National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42  
12 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.).

13 (2) ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW PROCESS.—

14 (A) IN GENERAL.—The term “environ-  
15 mental review process” means the process of  
16 preparing an environmental impact statement,  
17 environmental assessment, categorical exclusion,  
18 or other document under the National Environ-  
19 mental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et  
20 seq.) for a project study.

21 (B) INCLUSIONS.—The term “environ-  
22 mental review process” includes the process for  
23 and completion of any environmental permit,  
24 approval, review, or study required for a project  
25 study under any Federal law other than the

1 National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42  
2 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.).

3 (3) FEDERAL JURISDICTIONAL AGENCY.—The  
4 term “Federal jurisdictional agency” means a Fed-  
5 eral agency with jurisdiction delegated by law, regu-  
6 lation, order, or otherwise over a review, analysis,  
7 opinion, statement, permit, license, or other approval  
8 or decision required for a project study under appli-  
9 cable Federal laws (including regulations).

10 (4) FEDERAL LEAD AGENCY.—The term “Fed-  
11 eral lead agency” means the Bureau of Reclamation  
12 or Bureau of Indian Affairs.

13 (5) PROJECT.—The term “project” means—

14 (A) a surface water project, a project  
15 under the purview of title XVI of Public Law  
16 102–575, a rural water supply project inves-  
17 tigated under Public Law 109–451, or a Fed-  
18 eral portion of an integrated water resource  
19 management plan that has been subject to a re-  
20 view under the National Environmental Policy  
21 Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) and is to  
22 be carried out, funded or operated in whole or  
23 in party by the Secretary pursuant to the Act  
24 of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 388, chapter 1093),

1 and Acts supplemental to and amendatory of  
2 that Act (43 U.S.C. 371 et seq.); or

3 (B) Indian irrigation projects in the west-  
4 ern United States that, on the date of the en-  
5 actment of this Act, are owned by the Federal  
6 Government, as listed in the Federal inventory  
7 required by Executive Order 13327 (40 U.S.C.  
8 121 note; relating to Federal real property  
9 asset management).

10 (6) PROJECT SPONSOR.—The term “project  
11 sponsor” means a State, regional, Tribal, or local  
12 authority or instrumentality or other qualifying enti-  
13 ty, such as a water conservation district, irrigation  
14 district, water conservancy district, joint powers au-  
15 thority, mutual water company, canal company,  
16 rural water district or association, or any other enti-  
17 ty that has the capacity to contract with the United  
18 States under Federal reclamation law.

19 (7) PROJECT STUDY.—The term “project  
20 study” means a feasibility study for a project carried  
21 out pursuant to the Act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat.  
22 388, chapter 1093), and Acts supplemental to and  
23 amendatory of that Act (43 U.S.C. 371 et seq.).

24 (8) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means  
25 the Secretary of the Interior.

1           (9) SURFACE WATER STORAGE.—The term  
2           “surface water storage” means any surface water  
3           reservoir or impoundment that would be owned,  
4           funded or operated in whole or in part by the Bu-  
5           reau of Reclamation or the Bureau of Indian Affairs  
6           or that would be integrated into a larger system  
7           owned, operated or administered in whole or in part  
8           by the Bureau of Reclamation or the Bureau of In-  
9           dian Affairs.

10 **SEC. 5002. ACCELERATION OF STUDIES.**

11           (a) IN GENERAL.—To the extent practicable, a  
12           project study initiated by the Secretary, after the date of  
13           the enactment of this Act, shall—

14                   (1) result in the completion of a final feasibility  
15                   report not later than 3 years after the date of initi-  
16                   ation;

17                   (2) have a maximum Federal cost of  
18                   \$3,000,000; and

19                   (3) ensure that personnel from the local project  
20                   area, region, and headquarters levels of the Bureau  
21                   of Reclamation or the Bureau of Indian Affairs con-  
22                   currently conduct the review required under that  
23                   section.

24           (b) EXTENSION.—If the Secretary determines that a  
25           project study described in subsection (a) will not be con-

1 ducted in accordance with subsection (a), the Secretary,  
2 not later than 30 days after the date of making the deter-  
3 mination, shall—

4 (1) prepare an updated project study schedule  
5 and cost estimate;

6 (2) notify the non-Federal project cost-sharing  
7 partner that the project study has been delayed; and

8 (3) provide written notice to the Committee on  
9 Natural Resources of the House of Representatives  
10 and the Committee on Energy and Natural Re-  
11 sources of the Senate as to the reasons the require-  
12 ments of subsection (a) are not attainable.

13 (c) EXCEPTION.—

14 (1) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding the re-  
15 quirements of subsection (a), the Secretary may ex-  
16 tend the timeline of a project study by a period not  
17 to exceed 3 years, if the Secretary determines that  
18 the project study is too complex to comply with the  
19 requirements of subsection (a).

20 (2) FACTORS.—In making a determination that  
21 a study is too complex to comply with the require-  
22 ments of subsection (a), the Secretary shall con-  
23 sider—

24 (A) the type, size, location, scope, and  
25 overall cost of the project;

1 (B) whether the project will use any inno-  
2 vative design or construction techniques;

3 (C) whether the project will require signifi-  
4 cant action by other Federal, State, or local  
5 agencies;

6 (D) whether there is significant public dis-  
7 pute as to the nature or effects of the project;  
8 and

9 (E) whether there is significant public dis-  
10 pute as to the economic or environmental costs  
11 or benefits of the project.

12 (3) NOTIFICATION.—Each time the Secretary  
13 makes a determination under this subsection, the  
14 Secretary shall provide written notice to the Com-  
15 mittee on Natural Resources of the House of Rep-  
16 resentatives and the Committees on Energy and  
17 Natural Resources and Indian Affairs of the Senate  
18 as to the results of that determination, including an  
19 identification of the specific one or more factors  
20 used in making the determination that the project is  
21 complex.

22 (4) LIMITATION.—The Secretary shall not ex-  
23 tend the timeline for a project study for a period of  
24 more than 7 years, and any project study that is not

1 completed before that date shall no longer be au-  
2 thorized.

3 (d) **REVIEWS.**—Not later than 90 days after the date  
4 of the initiation of a project study described in subsection  
5 (a), the Secretary shall—

6 (1) take all steps necessary to initiate the proc-  
7 ess for completing federally mandated reviews that  
8 the Secretary is required to complete as part of the  
9 study, including the environmental review process  
10 under section 5;

11 (2) convene a meeting of all Federal, Tribal,  
12 and State agencies identified under section 5(d) that  
13 may—

14 (A) have jurisdiction over the project;

15 (B) be required by law to conduct or issue  
16 a review, analysis, opinion, or statement for the  
17 project study; or

18 (C) be required to make a determination  
19 on issuing a permit, license, or other approval  
20 or decision for the project study; and

21 (3) take all steps necessary to provide informa-  
22 tion that will enable required reviews and analyses  
23 related to the project to be conducted by other agen-  
24 cies in a thorough and timely manner.

1 (e) INTERIM REPORT.—Not later than 18 months  
2 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary  
3 shall submit to the Committee on Natural Resources of  
4 the House of Representatives and the Committees on En-  
5 ergy and Natural Resources and Indian Affairs of the Sen-  
6 ate and make publicly available a report that describes—

7 (1) the status of the implementation of the  
8 planning process under this section, including the  
9 number of participating projects;

10 (2) a review of project delivery schedules, in-  
11 cluding a description of any delays on those studies  
12 initiated prior to the date of the enactment of this  
13 Act; and

14 (3) any recommendations for additional author-  
15 ity necessary to support efforts to expedite the  
16 project.

17 (f) FINAL REPORT.—Not later than 4 years after the  
18 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall sub-  
19 mit to the Committee on Natural Resources of the House  
20 of Representatives and the Committees on Energy and  
21 Natural Resources and Indian Affairs of the Senate and  
22 make publicly available a report that describes—

23 (1) the status of the implementation of this sec-  
24 tion, including a description of each project study  
25 subject to the requirements of this section;



1           (2) the amount of time taken to complete each  
2 project study; and

3           (3) any recommendations for additional author-  
4 ity necessary to support efforts to expedite the  
5 project study process, including an analysis of  
6 whether the limitation established by subsection  
7 (a)(2) needs to be adjusted to address the impacts  
8 of inflation.

9 **SEC. 5003. EXPEDITED COMPLETION OF REPORTS.**

10 The Secretary shall—

11           (1) expedite the completion of any ongoing  
12 project study initiated before the date of the enact-  
13 ment of this Act; and

14           (2) if the Secretary determines that the project  
15 is justified in a completed report, proceed directly to  
16 preconstruction planning, engineering, and design of  
17 the project in accordance with the Reclamation Act  
18 of 1902 (32 Stat. 388), and all Acts amendatory  
19 thereof or supplementary thereto.

20 **SEC. 5004. PROJECT ACCELERATION.**

21 (a) APPLICABILITY.—

22           (1) IN GENERAL.—This section shall apply to—

23                   (A) each project study that is initiated  
24 after the date of the enactment of this Act and  
25 for which an environmental impact statement is

1 prepared under the National Environmental  
2 Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.);

3 (B) the extent determined appropriate by  
4 the Secretary, to other project studies initiated  
5 before the date of the enactment of this Act  
6 and for which an environmental review process  
7 document is prepared under the National Envi-  
8 ronmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321  
9 et seq.); and

10 (C) any project study for the development  
11 of a non-federally owned and operated surface  
12 water storage project for which the Secretary  
13 determines there is a demonstrable Federal in-  
14 terest and the project—

15 (i) is located in a river basin where  
16 other Bureau of Reclamation or the Bu-  
17 reau of Indian Affairs water projects are  
18 located;

19 (ii) will create additional water sup-  
20 plies that support Bureau of Reclamation  
21 or the Bureau of Indian Affairs water  
22 projects; or

23 (iii) will become integrated into the  
24 operation of Bureau of Reclamation or the  
25 Bureau of Indian Affairs water projects.

1           (2) FLEXIBILITY.—Any authority granted  
2 under this section may be exercised, and any re-  
3 quirement established under this section may be sat-  
4 isfied, for the conduct of an environmental review  
5 process for a project study, a class of project stud-  
6 ies, or a program of project studies.

7           (3) LIST OF PROJECT STUDIES.—

8           (A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall an-  
9 nually prepare, and make publicly available, a  
10 list of all project studies that the Secretary has  
11 determined—

12                   (i) meet the standards described in  
13 paragraph (1); and

14                   (ii) do not have adequate funding to  
15 make substantial progress toward the com-  
16 pletion of the project study.

17           (B) INCLUSIONS.—The Secretary shall in-  
18 clude for each project study on the list under  
19 subparagraph (A) a description of the estimated  
20 amounts necessary to make substantial progress  
21 on the project study.

22           (b) PROJECT REVIEW PROCESS.—

23           (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall develop  
24 and implement a coordinated environmental review  
25 process for the development of project studies.

1           (2) COORDINATED REVIEW.—The coordinated  
2 environmental review process described in paragraph  
3 (1) shall require that any review, analysis, opinion,  
4 statement, permit, license, or other approval or deci-  
5 sion issued or made by a Federal, State, or local  
6 governmental agency or an Indian Tribe for a  
7 project study described in subsection (b) be con-  
8 ducted, to the maximum extent practicable, concu-  
9 rrently with any other applicable governmental agen-  
10 cy or Indian Tribe.

11           (3) TIMING.—The coordinated environmental  
12 review process under this subsection shall be com-  
13 pleted not later than the date on which the Sec-  
14 retary, in consultation and concurrence with the  
15 agencies identified under section 5(d), establishes  
16 with respect to the project study.

17 (c) LEAD AGENCIES.—

18           (1) JOINT LEAD AGENCIES.—

19           (A) IN GENERAL.—Subject to the require-  
20 ments of the National Environmental Policy  
21 Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) and the  
22 requirements of section 1506.8 of title 40, Code  
23 of Federal Regulations (or successor regula-  
24 tions), including the concurrence of the pro-

1           posed joint lead agency, a project sponsor may  
2           serve as the joint lead agency.

3           (B) PROJECT SPONSOR AS JOINT LEAD  
4           AGENCY.—A project sponsor that is a State or  
5           local governmental entity may—

6                   (i) with the concurrence of the Sec-  
7                   retary, serve as a joint lead agency with  
8                   the Federal lead agency for purposes of  
9                   preparing any environmental document  
10                  under the National Environmental Policy  
11                  Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.); and

12                  (ii) prepare any environmental review  
13                  process document under the National En-  
14                  vironmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C.  
15                  4321 et seq.) required in support of any  
16                  action or approval by the Secretary if—

17                   (I) the Secretary provides guid-  
18                   ance in the preparation process and  
19                   independently evaluates that docu-  
20                   ment;

21                   (II) the project sponsor complies  
22                   with all requirements applicable to the  
23                   Secretary under—

1 (aa) the National Environ-  
2 mental Policy Act of 1969 (42  
3 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.);

4 (bb) any regulation imple-  
5 menting that Act; and

6 (cc) any other applicable  
7 Federal law; and

8 (III) the Secretary approves and  
9 adopts the document before the Sec-  
10 retary takes any subsequent action or  
11 makes any approval based on that  
12 document, regardless of whether the  
13 action or approval of the Secretary re-  
14 sults in Federal funding.

15 (2) DUTIES.—The Secretary shall ensure  
16 that—

17 (A) the project sponsor complies with all  
18 design and mitigation commitments made joint-  
19 ly by the Secretary and the project sponsor in  
20 any environmental document prepared by the  
21 project sponsor in accordance with this sub-  
22 section; and

23 (B) any environmental document prepared  
24 by the project sponsor is appropriately supple-

1           mented to address any changes to the project  
2           the Secretary determines are necessary.

3           (3) ADOPTION AND USE OF DOCUMENTS.—Any  
4           environmental document prepared in accordance  
5           with this subsection shall be adopted and used by  
6           any Federal agency making any determination re-  
7           lated to the project study to the same extent that  
8           the Federal agency could adopt or use a document  
9           prepared by another Federal agency under—

10                   (A) the National Environmental Policy Act  
11                   of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.); and

12                   (B) parts 1500 through 1508 of title 40,  
13                   Code of Federal Regulations (or successor regu-  
14                   lations).

15           (4) ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITY OF LEAD  
16           AGENCY.—With respect to the environmental review  
17           process for any project study, the Federal lead agen-  
18           cy shall have authority and responsibility—

19                   (A) to take such actions as are necessary  
20                   and proper and within the authority of the Fed-  
21                   eral lead agency to facilitate the expeditious  
22                   resolution of the environmental review process  
23                   for the project study; and

24                   (B) to prepare or ensure that any required  
25                   environmental impact statement or other envi-

1           ronmental review document for a project study  
2           required to be completed under the National  
3           Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C.  
4           4321 et seq.) is completed in accordance with  
5           this section and applicable Federal law.

6           (d) PARTICIPATING AND COOPERATING AGENCIES.—

7           (1) IDENTIFICATION OF JURISDICTIONAL AGEN-  
8           CIES.—With respect to carrying out the environ-  
9           mental review process for a project study, the Sec-  
10          retary shall identify, as early as practicable in the  
11          environmental review process, all Federal, State, and  
12          local government agencies and Indian Tribes that  
13          may—

14                   (A) have jurisdiction over the project;  
15                   (B) be required by law to conduct or issue  
16                   a review, analysis, opinion, or statement for the  
17                   project study; or  
18                   (C) be required to make a determination  
19                   on issuing a permit, license, or other approval  
20                   or decision for the project study.

21          (2) STATE AUTHORITY.—If the environmental  
22          review process is being implemented by the Sec-  
23          retary for a project study within the boundaries of  
24          a State, the State, consistent with State law, may



1 choose to participate in the process and to make  
2 subject to the process all State agencies that—

3 (A) have jurisdiction over the project;

4 (B) are required to conduct or issue a re-  
5 view, analysis, opinion, or statement for the  
6 project study; or

7 (C) are required to make a determination  
8 on issuing a permit, license, or other approval  
9 or decision for the project study.

10 (3) INVITATION.—

11 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Federal lead agen-  
12 cy shall invite, as early as practicable in the en-  
13 vironmental review process, any agency identi-  
14 fied under paragraph (1) to become a partici-  
15 pating or cooperating agency, as applicable, in  
16 the environmental review process for the project  
17 study.

18 (B) DEADLINE.—An invitation to partici-  
19 pate issued under subparagraph (A) shall set a  
20 deadline by which a response to the invitation  
21 shall be submitted, which may be extended by  
22 the Federal lead agency for good cause.

23 (4) PROCEDURES.—Section 1501.6 of title 40,  
24 Code of Federal Regulations (as in effect on the  
25 date of the enactment of this Act), shall govern the

1 identification and the participation of a cooperating  
2 agency.

3 (5) FEDERAL COOPERATING AGENCIES.—Any  
4 Federal agency that is invited by the Federal lead  
5 agency to participate in the environmental review  
6 process for a project study shall be designated as a  
7 cooperating agency by the Federal lead agency un-  
8 less the invited agency informs the Federal lead  
9 agency, in writing, by the deadline specified in the  
10 invitation that the invited agency—

11 (A)(i) has no jurisdiction or authority with  
12 respect to the project;

13 (ii) has no expertise or information rel-  
14 evant to the project; or

15 (iii) does not have adequate funds to par-  
16 ticipate in the project; and

17 (B) does not intend to submit comments  
18 on the project.

19 (6) ADMINISTRATION.—A participating or co-  
20 operating agency shall comply with this section and  
21 any schedule established under this section.

22 (7) EFFECT OF DESIGNATION.—Designation as  
23 a participating or cooperating agency under this  
24 subsection shall not imply that the participating or  
25 cooperating agency—

1 (A) supports a proposed project; or

2 (B) has any jurisdiction over, or special ex-  
3 pertise with respect to evaluation of, the  
4 project.

5 (8) CONCURRENT REVIEWS.—Each partici-  
6 pating or cooperating agency shall—

7 (A) carry out the obligations of that agen-  
8 cy under other applicable law concurrently and  
9 in conjunction with the required environmental  
10 review process, unless doing so would prevent  
11 the participating or cooperating agency from  
12 conducting needed analysis or otherwise car-  
13 rying out those obligations; and

14 (B) formulate and implement administra-  
15 tive, policy, and procedural mechanisms to en-  
16 able the agency to ensure completion of the en-  
17 vironmental review process in a timely, coordi-  
18 nated, and environmentally responsible manner.

19 (e) NON-FEDERAL PROJECTS INTERGRATED INTO  
20 RECLAMATION SYSTEMS.—The Federal lead agency shall  
21 serve in that capacity for the entirety of all non-Federal  
22 projects that will be integrated into a larger system owned,  
23 operated or administered in whole or in part by the Bu-  
24 reau of Reclamation or the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

1           (f) NON-FEDERAL PROJECT.—If the Secretary deter-  
2 mines that a project can be expedited by a non-Federal  
3 sponsor and that there is a demonstrable Federal interest  
4 in expediting that project, the Secretary shall take such  
5 actions as are necessary to advance such a project as a  
6 non-Federal project, including, but not limited to, entering  
7 into agreements with the non-Federal sponsor of such  
8 project to support the planning, design and permitting of  
9 such project as a non-Federal project.

10          (g) PROGRAMMATIC COMPLIANCE.—

11           (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall issue  
12 guidance regarding the use of programmatic ap-  
13 proaches to carry out the environmental review proc-  
14 ess that—

15                   (A) eliminates repetitive discussions of the  
16 same issues;

17                   (B) focuses on the actual issues ripe for  
18 analyses at each level of review;

19                   (C) establishes a formal process for coordi-  
20 nating with participating and cooperating agen-  
21 cies, including the creation of a list of all data  
22 that are needed to carry out an environmental  
23 review process; and

24                   (D) complies with—

1 (i) the National Environmental Policy  
2 Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.); and

3 (ii) all other applicable laws.

4 (2) REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out para-  
5 graph (1), the Secretary shall—

6 (A) as the first step in drafting guidance  
7 under that paragraph, consult with relevant  
8 Federal, State, and local governmental agen-  
9 cies, Indian Tribes, and the public on the ap-  
10 propriate use and scope of the programmatic  
11 approaches;

12 (B) emphasize the importance of collabora-  
13 tion among relevant Federal, State, and local  
14 governmental agencies, and Indian Tribes in  
15 undertaking programmatic reviews, especially  
16 with respect to including reviews with a broad  
17 geographical scope;

18 (C) ensure that the programmatic re-  
19 views—

20 (i) promote transparency, including of  
21 the analyses and data used in the environ-  
22 mental review process, the treatment of  
23 any deferred issues raised by Federal,  
24 State, and local governmental agencies, In-  
25 dian Tribes, or the public, and the tem-

1                   poral and special scales to be used to ana-  
2                   lyze those issues;

3                   (ii) use accurate and timely informa-  
4                   tion in the environmental review process,  
5                   including—

6                   (I) criteria for determining the  
7                   general duration of the usefulness of  
8                   the review; and

9                   (II) the timeline for updating any  
10                  out-of-date review;

11                  (iii) describe—

12                  (I) the relationship between pro-  
13                  grammatic analysis and future tiered  
14                  analysis; and

15                  (II) the role of the public in the  
16                  creation of future tiered analysis; and

17                  (iv) are available to other relevant  
18                  Federal, State, and local governmental  
19                  agencies, Indian Tribes, and the public;

20                  (D) allow not fewer than 60 days of public  
21                  notice and comment on any proposed guidance;  
22                  and

23                  (E) address any comments received under  
24                  subparagraph (D).

25                  (h) COORDINATED REVIEWS.—

1 (1) COORDINATION PLAN.—

2 (A) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Federal lead  
3 agency shall, after consultation with and with  
4 the concurrence of each participating and co-  
5 operating agency and the project sponsor or  
6 joint lead agency, as applicable, establish a plan  
7 for coordinating public and agency participation  
8 in, and comment on, the environmental review  
9 process for a project study or a category of  
10 project studies.

11 (B) SCHEDULE.—

12 (i) IN GENERAL.—As soon as prac-  
13 ticable but not later than 45 days after the  
14 close of the public comment period on a  
15 draft environmental impact statement, the  
16 Federal lead agency, after consultation  
17 with and the concurrence of each partici-  
18 pating and cooperating agency and the  
19 project sponsor or joint lead agency, as ap-  
20 plicable, shall establish, as part of the co-  
21 ordination plan established in subpara-  
22 graph (A), a schedule for completion of the  
23 environmental review process for the  
24 project study.

1 (ii) FACTORS FOR CONSIDERATION.—

2 In establishing a schedule, the Secretary  
3 shall consider factors such as—

4 (I) the responsibilities of partici-  
5 pating and cooperating agencies under  
6 applicable laws;

7 (II) the resources available to the  
8 project sponsor, joint lead agency, and  
9 other relevant Federal and State  
10 agencies, as applicable;

11 (III) the overall size and com-  
12 plexity of the project;

13 (IV) the overall schedule for and  
14 cost of the project; and

15 (V) the sensitivity of the natural  
16 and historical resources that could be  
17 affected by the project.

18 (iii) MODIFICATIONS.—The Secretary  
19 may—

20 (I) lengthen a schedule estab-  
21 lished under clause (i) for good cause;  
22 and

23 (II) shorten a schedule only with  
24 concurrence of the affected partici-  
25 pating and cooperating agencies and



1 the project sponsor or joint lead agen-  
2 cy, as applicable.

3 (iv) DISSEMINATION.—A copy of a  
4 schedule established under clause (i) shall  
5 be—

6 (I) provided to each participating  
7 and cooperating agency and the  
8 project sponsor or joint lead agency,  
9 as applicable; and

10 (II) made available to the public.

11 (2) COMMENT DEADLINES.—The Federal lead  
12 agency shall establish the following deadlines for  
13 comment during the environmental review process  
14 for a project study:

15 (A) DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT  
16 STATEMENTS.—For comments by Federal and  
17 State agencies and the public on a draft envi-  
18 ronmental impact statement, a period of not  
19 more than 60 days after publication in the Fed-  
20 eral Register of notice of the date of public  
21 availability of the draft environmental impact  
22 statement, unless—

23 (i) a different deadline is established  
24 by agreement of the Federal lead agency,  
25 the project sponsor or joint lead agency, as

1 applicable, and all participating and co-  
2 operating agencies; or

3 (ii) the deadline is extended by the  
4 Federal lead agency for good cause.

5 (B) OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW  
6 PROCESSES.—For all other comment periods es-  
7 tablished by the Federal lead agency for agency  
8 or public comments in the environmental review  
9 process, a period of not more than 30 days  
10 after the date on which the materials on which  
11 comment is requested are made available, un-  
12 less—

13 (i) a different deadline is established  
14 by agreement of the Federal lead agency,  
15 the project sponsor, or joint lead agency,  
16 as applicable, and all participating and co-  
17 operating agencies; or

18 (ii) the deadline is extended by the  
19 Federal lead agency for good cause.

20 (3) DEADLINES FOR DECISIONS UNDER OTHER  
21 LAWS.—In any case in which a decision under any  
22 Federal law relating to a project study, including the  
23 issuance or denial of a permit or license, is required  
24 to be made by the date described in subsection  
25 (i)(5)(B), the Secretary shall submit to the Com-

1       committee on Natural Resources of the House of Rep-  
2       resentatives and the Committees on Energy and  
3       Natural Resources and Indian Affairs of the Sen-  
4       ate—

5               (A) as soon as practicable after the 180-  
6       day period described in subsection (i)(5)(B), an  
7       initial notice of the failure of the Federal agen-  
8       cy to make the decision; and

9               (B) every 60 days thereafter until such  
10      date as all decisions of the Federal agency re-  
11      lating to the project study have been made by  
12      the Federal agency, an additional notice that  
13      describes the number of decisions of the Fed-  
14      eral agency that remain outstanding as of the  
15      date of the additional notice.

16           (4) INVOLVEMENT OF THE PUBLIC.—Nothing  
17      in this subsection reduces any time period provided  
18      for public comment in the environmental review  
19      process under applicable Federal law (including reg-  
20      ulations).

21           (5) TRANSPARENCY REPORTING.—

22               (A) REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.—Not  
23      later than 1 year after the date of the enact-  
24      ment of this Act, the Secretary shall establish  
25      and maintain an electronic database and, in co-

1           ordination with other Federal and State agen-  
2           cies, issue reporting requirements to make pub-  
3           licly available the status and progress with re-  
4           spect to compliance with applicable require-  
5           ments of the National Environmental Policy  
6           Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) and any  
7           other Federal, State, or local approval or action  
8           required for a project study for which this sec-  
9           tion is applicable.

10                   (B) PROJECT STUDY TRANSPARENCY.—

11           Consistent with the requirements established  
12           under subparagraph (A), the Secretary shall  
13           make publicly available the status and progress  
14           of any Federal, State, Tribal, or local decision,  
15           action, or approval required under applicable  
16           laws for each project study for which this sec-  
17           tion is applicable.

18                   (i) ISSUE IDENTIFICATION AND RESOLUTION.—

19                   (1) COOPERATION.—The Federal lead agency,  
20           the cooperating agencies, and any participating  
21           agencies shall work cooperatively in accordance with  
22           this section to identify and resolve issues that could  
23           delay completion of the environmental review process  
24           or result in the denial of any approval required for  
25           the project study under applicable laws.

1           (2) FEDERAL LEAD AGENCY RESPONSIBIL-  
2           ITIES.—

3           (A) IN GENERAL.—The Federal lead agen-  
4           cy shall make information available to the co-  
5           operating agencies and participating agencies as  
6           early as practicable in the environmental review  
7           process regarding the environmental and socio-  
8           economic resources located within the project  
9           area and the general locations of the alter-  
10          natives under consideration.

11          (B) DATA SOURCES.—The information  
12          under subparagraph (A) may be based on exist-  
13          ing data sources, including geographic informa-  
14          tion systems mapping.

15          (3) COOPERATING AND PARTICIPATING AGENCY  
16          RESPONSIBILITIES.—Based on information received  
17          from the Federal lead agency, cooperating and par-  
18          ticipating agencies shall identify, as early as prac-  
19          ticable, any issues of concern regarding the potential  
20          environmental or socioeconomic impacts of the  
21          project, including any issues that could substantially  
22          delay or prevent an agency from granting a permit  
23          or other approval that is needed for the project  
24          study.

1           (4) ACCELERATED ISSUE RESOLUTION AND  
2 ELEVATION.—

3           (A) IN GENERAL.—On the request of a  
4 participating or cooperating agency or project  
5 sponsor, the Secretary shall convene an issue  
6 resolution meeting with the relevant partici-  
7 pating and cooperating agencies and the project  
8 sponsor or joint lead agency, as applicable, to  
9 resolve issues that may—

10                   (i) delay completion of the environ-  
11 mental review process; or

12                   (ii) result in denial of any approval re-  
13 quired for the project study under applica-  
14 ble laws.

15           (B) MEETING DATE.—A meeting requested  
16 under this paragraph shall be held not later  
17 than 21 days after the date on which the Sec-  
18 retary receives the request for the meeting, un-  
19 less the Secretary determines that there is good  
20 cause to extend that deadline.

21           (C) NOTIFICATION.—On receipt of a re-  
22 quest for a meeting under this paragraph, the  
23 Secretary shall notify all relevant participating  
24 and cooperating agencies of the request, includ-

1           ing the issue to be resolved and the date for the  
2           meeting.

3                   (D) ELEVATION OF ISSUE RESOLUTION.—

4           If a resolution cannot be achieved within the  
5           30-day period beginning on the date of a meet-  
6           ing under this paragraph and a determination  
7           is made by the Secretary that all information  
8           necessary to resolve the issue has been ob-  
9           tained, the Secretary shall forward the dispute  
10          to the heads of the relevant agencies for resolu-  
11          tion.

12                   (E) CONVENTION BY SECRETARY.—The  
13          Secretary may convene an issue resolution  
14          meeting under this paragraph at any time, at  
15          the discretion of the Secretary, regardless of  
16          whether a meeting is requested under subpara-  
17          graph (A).

18                   (5) FINANCIAL PENALTY PROVISIONS.—

19                   (A) IN GENERAL.—A Federal jurisdictional  
20          agency shall complete any required approval or  
21          decision for the environmental review process  
22          on an expeditious basis using the shortest exist-  
23          ing applicable process.

24                   (B) FAILURE TO DECIDE.—

25                           (i) IN GENERAL.—

1 (I) TRANSFER OF FUNDS.—If a  
2 Federal jurisdictional agency fails to  
3 render a decision required under any  
4 Federal law relating to a project study  
5 that requires the preparation of an  
6 environmental impact statement or  
7 environmental assessment, including  
8 the issuance or denial of a permit, li-  
9 cense, statement, opinion, or other ap-  
10 proval by the date described in clause  
11 (ii), the amount of funds made avail-  
12 able to support the office of the head  
13 of the Federal jurisdictional agency  
14 shall be reduced by an amount of  
15 funding equal to the amount specified  
16 in item (aa) or (bb) of subclause (II),  
17 and those funds shall be made avail-  
18 able to the division of the Federal ju-  
19 risdictional agency charged with ren-  
20 dering the decision by not later than  
21 1 day after the applicable date under  
22 clause (ii), and once each week there-  
23 after until a final decision is rendered,  
24 subject to subparagraph (C).



1 (II) AMOUNT TO BE TRANS-  
2 FERRED.—The amount referred to in  
3 subclause (I) is—

4 (aa) \$20,000 for any project  
5 study requiring the preparation  
6 of an environmental assessment  
7 or environmental impact state-  
8 ment; or

9 (bb) \$10,000 for any project  
10 study requiring any type of re-  
11 view under the National Environ-  
12 mental Policy Act of 1969 (42  
13 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) other than  
14 an environmental assessment or  
15 environmental impact statement.

16 (ii) DESCRIPTION OF DATE.—The  
17 date referred to in clause (i) is the later  
18 of—

19 (I) the date that is 180 days  
20 after the date on which an application  
21 for the permit, license, or approval is  
22 complete; and

23 (II) the date that is 180 days  
24 after the date on which the Federal  
25 lead agency issues a decision on the

1 project under the National Environ-  
2 mental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C.  
3 4321 et seq.).

4 (C) LIMITATIONS.—

5 (i) IN GENERAL.—No transfer of  
6 funds under subparagraph (B) relating to  
7 an individual project study shall exceed, in  
8 any fiscal year, an amount equal to 1 per-  
9 cent of the funds made available for the  
10 applicable agency office.

11 (ii) FAILURE TO DECIDE.—The total  
12 amount transferred in a fiscal year as a re-  
13 sult of a failure by an agency to make a  
14 decision by an applicable deadline shall not  
15 exceed an amount equal to 5 percent of the  
16 funds made available for the applicable  
17 agency office for that fiscal year.

18 (iii) AGGREGATE.—Notwithstanding  
19 any other provision of law, for each fiscal  
20 year, the aggregate amount of financial  
21 penalties assessed against each applicable  
22 agency office under this Act and any other  
23 Federal law as a result of a failure of the  
24 agency to make a decision by an applicable  
25 deadline for environmental review, includ-

1           ing the total amount transferred under this  
2           paragraph, shall not exceed an amount  
3           equal to 9.5 percent of the funds made  
4           available for the agency office for that fis-  
5           cal year.

6           (D) NOTIFICATION OF TRANSFERS.—Not  
7           later than 10 days after the last date in a fiscal  
8           year on which funds of the Federal jurisdic-  
9           tional agency may be transferred under sub-  
10          paragraph (B)(5) with respect to an individual  
11          decision, the agency shall submit to the appro-  
12          priate committees of the House of Representa-  
13          tives and the Senate written notification that  
14          includes a description of—

- 15                   (i) the decision;
- 16                   (ii) the project study involved;
- 17                   (iii) the amount of each transfer  
18                   under subparagraph (B) in that fiscal year  
19                   relating to the decision;
- 20                   (iv) the total amount of all transfers  
21                   under subparagraph (B) in that fiscal year  
22                   relating to the decision; and
- 23                   (v) the total amount of all transfers of  
24                   the agency under subparagraph (B) in that  
25                   fiscal year.

1 (E) NO FAULT OF AGENCY.—

2 (i) IN GENERAL.—A transfer of funds  
3 under this paragraph shall not be made if  
4 the applicable agency described in subpara-  
5 graph (A) notifies, with a supporting ex-  
6 planation, the Federal lead agency, cooper-  
7 ating agencies, and project sponsor, as ap-  
8 plicable, that—

9 (I) the agency has not received  
10 necessary information or approvals  
11 from another entity in a manner that  
12 affects the ability of the agency to  
13 meet any requirements under Federal,  
14 State, or local law;

15 (II) significant new information,  
16 including from public comments, or  
17 circumstances, including a major  
18 modification to an aspect of the  
19 project, requires additional analysis  
20 for the agency to make a decision on  
21 the project application; or

22 (III) the agency lacks the finan-  
23 cial resources to complete the review  
24 under the scheduled timeframe, in-  
25 cluding a description of the number of

1 full-time employees required to com-  
2 plete the review, the amount of fund-  
3 ing required to complete the review,  
4 and a justification as to why not  
5 enough funding is available to com-  
6 plete the review by the deadline.

7 (ii) LACK OF FINANCIAL RE-  
8 SOURCES.—If the agency provides notice  
9 under clause (i)(III), the Inspector General  
10 of the agency shall—

11 (I) conduct a financial audit to  
12 review the notice; and

13 (II) not later than 90 days after  
14 the date on which the review described  
15 in subclause (I) is completed, submit  
16 to the Committee on Natural Re-  
17 sources of the House of Representa-  
18 tives and the Committee on Energy  
19 and Natural Resources of the Senate  
20 the results of the audit conducted  
21 under subclause (I).

22 (F) LIMITATION.—The Federal agency  
23 from which funds are transferred pursuant to  
24 this paragraph shall not reprogram funds to the  
25 office of the head of the agency, or equivalent

1 office, to reimburse that office for the loss of  
2 the funds.

3 (G) EFFECT OF PARAGRAPH.—Nothing in  
4 this paragraph affects or limits the application  
5 of, or obligation to comply with, any Federal,  
6 State, local, or Tribal law.

7 (j) MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENTS FOR EARLY CO-  
8 ORDINATION.—

9 (1) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of  
10 Congress that—

11 (A) the Secretary and other Federal agen-  
12 cies with relevant jurisdiction in the environ-  
13 mental review process should cooperate with  
14 each other, State and local agencies, and Indian  
15 Tribes on environmental review and Bureau of  
16 Reclamation project delivery activities at the  
17 earliest practicable time to avoid delays and du-  
18 plication of effort later in the process, prevent  
19 potential conflicts, and ensure that planning  
20 and project development decisions reflect envi-  
21 ronmental values; and

22 (B) the cooperation referred to in subpara-  
23 graph (A) should include the development of  
24 policies and the designation of staff that advise  
25 planning agencies and project sponsors of stud-

1           ies or other information foreseeably required for  
2           later Federal action and early consultation with  
3           appropriate State and local agencies and Indian  
4           Tribes.

5           (2) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—If requested at  
6           any time by a State or project sponsor, the Sec-  
7           retary and other Federal agencies with relevant ju-  
8           risdiction in the environmental review process, shall,  
9           to the maximum extent practicable and appropriate,  
10          as determined by the agencies, provide technical as-  
11          sistance to the State or project sponsor in carrying  
12          out early coordination activities.

13          (3) MEMORANDUM OF AGENCY AGREEMENT.—  
14          If requested at any time by a State or project spon-  
15          sor, the Federal lead agency, in consultation with  
16          other Federal agencies with relevant jurisdiction in  
17          the environmental review process, may establish  
18          memoranda of agreement with the project sponsor,  
19          Indian Tribes, State and local governments, and  
20          other appropriate entities to carry out the early co-  
21          ordination activities, including providing technical  
22          assistance in identifying potential impacts and miti-  
23          gation issues in an integrated fashion.

24          (k) LIMITATIONS.—Nothing in this section preempts  
25          or interferes with—

1           (1) any obligation to comply with the provisions  
2 of any Federal law, including—

3                 (A) the National Environmental Policy Act  
4 of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.); and

5                 (B) any other Federal environmental law;

6           (2) the reviewability of any final Federal agency  
7 action in a court of the United States or in the court  
8 of any State;

9           (3) any requirement for seeking, considering, or  
10 responding to public comment; or

11           (4) any power, jurisdiction, responsibility, duty,  
12 or authority that a Federal, State, or local govern-  
13 mental agency, Indian Tribe, or project sponsor has  
14 with respect to carrying out a project or any other  
15 provision of law applicable to projects.

16 (l) TIMING OF CLAIMS.—

17           (1) TIMING.—

18                 (A) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding any  
19 other provision of law, a claim arising under  
20 Federal law seeking judicial review of a permit,  
21 license, or other approval issued by a Federal  
22 agency for a project study shall be barred un-  
23 less the claim is filed not later than 3 years  
24 after publication of a notice in the Federal Reg-  
25 ister announcing that the permit, license, or



1 other approval is final pursuant to the law  
2 under which the agency action is taken, unless  
3 a shorter time is specified in the Federal law  
4 that allows judicial review.

5 (B) APPLICABILITY.—Nothing in this sub-  
6 section creates a right to judicial review or  
7 places any limit on filing a claim that a person  
8 has violated the terms of a permit, license, or  
9 other approval.

10 (2) NEW INFORMATION.—

11 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall  
12 consider new information received after the  
13 close of a comment period if the information  
14 satisfies the requirements for a supplemental  
15 environmental impact statement under title 40,  
16 Code of Federal Regulations (including suc-  
17 cessor regulations).

18 (B) SEPARATE ACTION.—The preparation  
19 of a supplemental environmental impact state-  
20 ment or other environmental document, if re-  
21 quired under this section, shall be considered a  
22 separate final agency action and the deadline  
23 for filing a claim for judicial review of the ac-  
24 tion shall be 3 years after the date of publica-  
25 tion of a notice in the Federal Register an-

1           nouncing the action relating to such supple-  
2           mental environmental impact statement or  
3           other environmental document.

4           (m) CATEGORICAL EXCLUSIONS.—

5           (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days  
6           after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-  
7           retary shall—

8                   (A) survey the use by the Bureau of Rec-  
9                   lamation and the Bureau of Indian Affairs of  
10                  categorical exclusions in projects since 2005;

11                  (B) publish a review of the survey that in-  
12                  cludes a description of—

13                          (i) the types of actions that were cat-  
14                          egorically excluded or could be the basis  
15                          for developing a new categorical exclusion;  
16                          and

17                          (ii) any requests previously received  
18                          by the Secretary for new categorical exclu-  
19                          sions; and

20                  (C) solicit requests from other Federal  
21                  agencies and project sponsors for new categor-  
22                  ical exclusions.

23           (2) NEW CATEGORICAL EXCLUSIONS.—Not  
24           later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of  
25           this Act, if the Secretary has identified a category

1 of activities that merit establishing a categorical ex-  
2 clusion that did not exist on the day before the date  
3 of the enactment of this Act based on the review  
4 under paragraph (1), the Secretary shall publish a  
5 notice of proposed rulemaking to propose that new  
6 categorical exclusion, to the extent that the categor-  
7 ical exclusion meets the criteria for a categorical ex-  
8 clusion under section 1508.4 of title 40, Code of  
9 Federal Regulations (or successor regulation).

10 (n) REVIEW OF PROJECT ACCELERATION RE-  
11 FORMS.—

12 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Comptroller General of  
13 the United States shall—

14 (A) assess the reforms carried out under  
15 this section; and

16 (B) not later than 5 years and not later  
17 than 10 years after the date of the enactment  
18 of this Act, submit to the Committee on Nat-  
19 ural Resources of the House of Representatives  
20 and the Committees on Energy and Natural  
21 Resources and Indian Affairs of the Senate a  
22 report that describes the results of the assess-  
23 ment.

1           (2) CONTENTS.—The reports under paragraph  
2           (1) shall include an evaluation of impacts of the re-  
3           forms carried out under this section on—

4                   (A) project delivery;

5                   (B) compliance with environmental laws;

6                   and

7                   (C) the environmental impact of projects.

8           (o) PERFORMANCE MEASUREMENT.—The Secretary  
9 shall establish a program to measure and report on  
10 progress made toward improving and expediting the plan-  
11 ning and environmental review process.

12          (p) CATEGORICAL EXCLUSIONS IN EMERGENCIES.—  
13 For the repair, reconstruction, or rehabilitation of a Bu-  
14 reau of Reclamation or Bureau of Indian Affairs project  
15 that is in operation or under construction when damaged  
16 by an event or incident that results in a declaration by  
17 the President of a major disaster or emergency pursuant  
18 to the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency  
19 Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.), the Secretary  
20 shall treat such repair, reconstruction, or rehabilitation  
21 activity as a class of action categorically excluded from  
22 the requirements relating to environmental assessments or  
23 environmental impact statements under section 1508.4 of  
24 title 40, Code of Federal Regulations (or successor regula-  
25 tions), if the repair or reconstruction activity is—

1           (1) in the same location with the same capacity,  
2           dimensions, and design as the original Bureau of  
3           Reclamation or Bureau of Indian Affairs project as  
4           before the declaration described in this section; and

5           (2) commenced within a 2-year period begin-  
6           ning on the date of a declaration described in this  
7           subsection.

8   **SEC. 5005. ANNUAL REPORT TO CONGRESS.**

9           (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than February 1 of each  
10          year, the Secretary shall develop and submit to the Com-  
11          mittee on Natural Resources of the House of Representa-  
12          tives and the Committees on Energy and Natural Re-  
13          sources and Indian Affairs of the Senate an annual report,  
14          to be entitled “Report to Congress on Future Water  
15          Project Development”, that identifies the following:

16           (1) PROJECT REPORTS.—Each project report  
17           that meets the criteria established in subsection  
18           (c)(1)(A).

19           (2) PROPOSED PROJECT STUDIES.—Any pro-  
20           posed project study submitted to the Secretary by a  
21           non-Federal interest pursuant to subsection (b) that  
22           meets the criteria established in subsection  
23           (c)(1)(A).

24           (3) PROPOSED MODIFICATIONS.—Any proposed  
25           modification to an authorized water project or

1 project study that meets the criteria established in  
2 subsection (c)(1)(A) that—

3 (A) is submitted to the Secretary by a non-  
4 Federal interest pursuant to subsection (b); or  
5 (B) is identified by the Secretary for au-  
6 thorization.

7 (4) EXPEDITED COMPLETION OF REPORT AND  
8 DETERMINATIONS.—Any project study that was ex-  
9 pedited and any Secretarial determinations under  
10 section 4 of this Act.

11 (b) REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS.—

12 (1) PUBLICATION.—Not later than May 1 of  
13 each year, the Secretary shall publish in the Federal  
14 Register a notice requesting proposals from non-  
15 Federal interests for proposed project studies and  
16 proposed modifications to authorized projects and  
17 project studies to be included in the annual report.

18 (2) DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS.—The Secretary  
19 shall include in each notice required by this sub-  
20 section a requirement that non-Federal interests  
21 submit to the Secretary any proposals described in  
22 paragraph (1) by not later than 120 days after the  
23 date of publication of the notice in the Federal Reg-  
24 ister in order for the proposals to be considered for  
25 inclusion in the annual report.

1           (3) NOTIFICATION.—On the date of publication  
2 of each notice required by this subsection, the Sec-  
3 retary shall—

4           (A) make the notice publicly available, in-  
5 cluding on the Internet; and

6           (B) provide written notification of the pub-  
7 lication to the Committee on Natural Resources  
8 of the House of Representatives and the Com-  
9 mittees on Energy and Natural Resources and  
10 Indian Affairs of the Senate.

11 (c) CONTENTS.—

12           (1) PROJECT REPORTS, PROPOSED PROJECT  
13 STUDIES, AND PROPOSED MODIFICATIONS.—

14           (A) CRITERIA FOR INCLUSION IN RE-  
15 PORT.—The Secretary shall include in the an-  
16 nual report only those project reports, proposed  
17 project studies, and proposed modifications to  
18 authorized projects and project studies that—

19           (i) are related to the missions and au-  
20 thorities of the Bureau of Reclamation or  
21 the Bureau of Indian Affairs;

22           (ii) require specific congressional au-  
23 thorization, including by an Act of Con-  
24 gress;

1 (iii) have not been congressionally au-  
2 thorized;

3 (iv) have not been included in any  
4 previous annual report; and

5 (v) if authorized, could be carried out  
6 by the Bureau of Reclamation or the Bu-  
7 reau of Indian Affairs.

8 (B) DESCRIPTION OF BENEFITS.—

9 (i) DESCRIPTION.—The Secretary  
10 shall describe in the annual report, to the  
11 extent applicable and practicable, for each  
12 proposed project study and proposed modi-  
13 fication to an authorized water resources  
14 development project or project study in-  
15 cluded in the annual report, the benefits,  
16 as described in clause (ii), of each such  
17 study or proposed modification.

18 (ii) BENEFITS.—The benefits (or ex-  
19 pected benefits, in the case of a proposed  
20 project study) described in this clause are  
21 benefits to—

22 (I) the protection of human life  
23 and property;

24 (II) domestic irrigated water and  
25 power supplies;



- 1 (III) the national economy;  
2 (IV) the environment; or  
3 (V) the national security inter-  
4 ests of the United States.

5 (C) IDENTIFICATION OF OTHER FAC-  
6 TORS.—The Secretary shall identify in the an-  
7 nual report, to the extent practicable—

8 (i) for each proposed project study in-  
9 cluded in the annual report, the non-Fed-  
10 eral interest that submitted the proposed  
11 project study pursuant to subsection (b);  
12 and

13 (ii) for each proposed project study  
14 and proposed modification to a project or  
15 project study included in the annual re-  
16 port, whether the non-Federal interest has  
17 demonstrated—

18 (I) that local support exists for  
19 the proposed project study or pro-  
20 posed modification to an authorized  
21 project or project study (including the  
22 surface water storage development  
23 project that is the subject of the pro-  
24 posed feasibility study or the proposed

1 modification to an authorized project  
2 study); and

3 (II) the financial ability to pro-  
4 vide the required non-Federal cost  
5 share.

6 (2) TRANSPARENCY.—The Secretary shall in-  
7 clude in the annual report, for each project report,  
8 proposed project study, and proposed modification to  
9 a project or project study included under paragraph  
10 (1)(A)—

11 (A) the name of the associated non-Fed-  
12 eral interest, including the name of any non-  
13 Federal interest that has contributed, or is ex-  
14 pected to contribute, a non-Federal share of the  
15 cost of—

16 (i) the project report;

17 (ii) the proposed project study;

18 (iii) the authorized project study for  
19 which the modification is proposed; or

20 (iv) construction of—

21 (I) the project that is the subject  
22 of—

23 (aa) the water report;

24 (bb) the proposed project  
25 study; or

1 (cc) the authorized project  
2 study for which a modification is  
3 proposed; or

4 (II) the proposed modification to  
5 a project;

6 (B) a letter or statement of support for the  
7 water report, proposed project study, or pro-  
8 posed modification to a project or project study  
9 from each associated non-Federal interest;

10 (C) the purpose of the feasibility report,  
11 proposed feasibility study, or proposed modi-  
12 fication to a project or project study;

13 (D) an estimate, to the extent practicable,  
14 of the Federal, non-Federal, and total costs  
15 of—

16 (i) the proposed modification to an  
17 authorized project study; and

18 (ii) construction of—

19 (I) the project that is the subject  
20 of—

21 (aa) the project report; or

22 (bb) the authorized project  
23 study for which a modification is  
24 proposed, with respect to the

1 change in costs resulting from  
2 such modification; or

3 (II) the proposed modification to  
4 an authorized project; and

5 (E) an estimate, to the extent practicable,  
6 of the monetary and nonmonetary benefits of—

7 (i) the project that is the subject of—

8 (I) the project report; or

9 (II) the authorized project study  
10 for which a modification is proposed,  
11 with respect to the benefits of such  
12 modification; or

13 (ii) the proposed modification to an  
14 authorized project.

15 (3) CERTIFICATION.—The Secretary shall in-  
16 clude in the annual report a certification stating  
17 that each feasibility report, proposed feasibility  
18 study, and proposed modification to a project or  
19 project study included in the annual report meets  
20 the criteria established in paragraph (1)(A).

21 (4) APPENDIX.—The Secretary shall include in  
22 the annual report an appendix listing the proposals  
23 submitted under subsection (b) that were not in-  
24 cluded in the annual report under paragraph (1)(A)  
25 and a description of why the Secretary determined

1       that those proposals did not meet the criteria for in-  
2       clusion under such paragraph.

3       (d) SPECIAL RULE FOR INITIAL ANNUAL REPORT.—

4       Notwithstanding any other deadlines required by this sec-  
5       tion, the Secretary shall—

6               (1) not later than 60 days after the date of the  
7       enactment of this Act, publish in the Federal Reg-  
8       ister a notice required by subsection (b)(1); and

9               (2) include in such notice a requirement that  
10      non-Federal interests submit to the Secretary any  
11      proposals described in subsection (b)(1) by not later  
12      than 120 days after the date of publication of such  
13      notice in the Federal Register in order for such pro-  
14      posals to be considered for inclusion in the first an-  
15      nual report developed by the Secretary under this  
16      section.

17      (e) PUBLICATION.—Upon submission of an annual  
18      report to Congress, the Secretary shall make the annual  
19      report publicly available, including through publication on  
20      the Internet.

21      (f) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term “project  
22      report” means a final feasibility report developed under  
23      the Reclamation Act of 1902 (32 Stat. 388), and all Acts  
24      amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto.

1 **SEC. 5006. APPLICABILITY OF THE WIIN ACT.**

2 Sections 3221 through 3226, 4007 and 4009 of the  
3 WIIN Act (Public Law 114–322) shall not apply to any  
4 project (as defined in section 2 of this Act).

5 **TITLE VI—WATER SUPPLY PER-**  
6 **MITTING COORDINATION ACT**

7 **SEC. 6001. DEFINITIONS.**

8 In this title:

9 (1) BUREAU.—The term “Bureau” means the  
10 Bureau of Reclamation.

11 (2) COOPERATING AGENCIES.—The term “co-  
12 operating agency” means a Federal agency with ju-  
13 risdiction over a review, analysis, opinion, statement,  
14 permit, license, or other approval or decision re-  
15 quired for a qualifying project under applicable Fed-  
16 eral laws and regulations, or a State agency subject  
17 to section 3(c).

18 (3) QUALIFYING PROJECTS.—The term “quali-  
19 fying projects” means new surface water storage  
20 projects in the States covered under the Act of June  
21 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 388, chapter 1093), and Acts  
22 supplemental to and amendatory of that Act (43  
23 U.S.C. 371 et seq.) constructed on lands adminis-  
24 tered by the Department of the Interior or the De-  
25 partment of Agriculture, exclusive of any easement,  
26 right-of-way, lease, or any private holding, unless the

1 project applicant elects not to participate in the  
2 process authorized by this Act. Such term shall also  
3 include State-led projects (as defined in section  
4 4007(a)(2) of the WIIN Act) for new surface water  
5 storage projects in the States covered under the Act  
6 of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 388, chapter 1093), and  
7 Acts supplemental to and amendatory of that Act  
8 (43 U.S.C. 371 et seq.), constructed on lands ad-  
9 ministered by the Department of the Interior or the  
10 Department of Agriculture, exclusive of any ease-  
11 ment, right-of-way, lease, or any private holding, un-  
12 less the project applicant elects not to participate in  
13 the process authorized by this Act.

14 (4) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means  
15 the Secretary of the Interior.

16 **SEC. 6002. ESTABLISHMENT OF LEAD AGENCY AND CO-**  
17 **OPERATING AGENCIES.**

18 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF LEAD AGENCY.—The Bu-  
19 reau is established as the lead agency for purposes of co-  
20 ordinating all reviews, analyses, opinions, statements, per-  
21 mits, licenses, or other approvals or decisions required  
22 under Federal law to construct qualifying projects.

23 (b) IDENTIFICATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF CO-  
24 OPERATING AGENCIES.—The Commissioner of the Bureau  
25 shall—

1           (1) identify, as early as practicable upon receipt  
2 of an application for a qualifying project, any Fed-  
3 eral agency that may have jurisdiction over a review,  
4 analysis, opinion, statement, permit, license, ap-  
5 proval, or decision required for a qualifying project  
6 under applicable Federal laws and regulations; and

7           (2) notify any such agency, within a reasonable  
8 timeframe, that the agency has been designated as  
9 a cooperating agency in regards to the qualifying  
10 project unless that agency responds to the Bureau in  
11 writing, within a timeframe set forth by the Bureau,  
12 notifying the Bureau that the agency—

13           (A) has no jurisdiction or authority with  
14 respect to the qualifying project;

15           (B) has no expertise or information rel-  
16 evant to the qualifying project or any review,  
17 analysis, opinion, statement, permit, license, or  
18 other approval or decision associated therewith;  
19 or

20           (C) does not intend to submit comments  
21 on the qualifying project or conduct any review  
22 of such a project or make any decision with re-  
23 spect to such project in a manner other than in  
24 cooperation with the Bureau.



1 (c) STATE AUTHORITY.—A State in which a quali-  
2 fying project is being considered may choose, consistent  
3 with State law—

4 (1) to participate as a cooperating agency; and

5 (2) to make subject to the processes of this Act  
6 all State agencies that—

7 (A) have jurisdiction over the qualifying  
8 project;

9 (B) are required to conduct or issue a re-  
10 view, analysis, or opinion for the qualifying  
11 project; or

12 (C) are required to make a determination  
13 on issuing a permit, license, or approval for the  
14 qualifying project.

15 **SEC. 6003. BUREAU RESPONSIBILITIES.**

16 (a) IN GENERAL.—The principal responsibilities of  
17 the Bureau under this Act are—

18 (1) to serve as the point of contact for appli-  
19 cants, State agencies, Indian Tribes, and others re-  
20 garding proposed qualifying projects;

21 (2) to coordinate preparation of unified environ-  
22 mental documentation that will serve as the basis for  
23 all Federal decisions necessary to authorize the use  
24 of Federal lands for qualifying projects; and

1           (3) to coordinate all Federal agency reviews  
2           necessary for project development and construction  
3           of qualifying projects.

4           (b) COORDINATION PROCESS.—The Bureau shall  
5           have the following coordination responsibilities:

6           (1) PREAPPLICATION COORDINATION.—Notify  
7           cooperating agencies of proposed qualifying projects  
8           not later than 30 days after receipt of a proposal  
9           and facilitate a preapplication meeting for prospec-  
10          tive applicants, relevant Federal and State agencies,  
11          and Indian Tribes—

12                   (A) to explain applicable processes, data  
13                   requirements, and applicant submissions nec-  
14                   essary to complete the required Federal agency  
15                   reviews within the timeframe established; and

16                   (B) to establish the schedule for the quali-  
17                   fying project.

18          (2) CONSULTATION WITH COOPERATING AGEN-  
19          CIES.—Consult with the cooperating agencies  
20          throughout the Federal agency review process, iden-  
21          tify and obtain relevant data in a timely manner,  
22          and set necessary deadlines for cooperating agencies.

23          (3) SCHEDULE.—Work with the qualifying  
24          project applicant and cooperating agencies to estab-

1       lish a project schedule. In establishing the schedule,  
2       the Bureau shall consider, among other factors—

3               (A) the responsibilities of cooperating  
4               agencies under applicable laws and regulations;

5               (B) the resources available to the cooper-  
6               ating agencies and the non-Federal qualifying  
7               project sponsor, as applicable;

8               (C) the overall size and complexity of the  
9               qualifying project;

10              (D) the overall schedule for and cost of the  
11              qualifying project; and

12              (E) the sensitivity of the natural and his-  
13              toric resources that may be affected by the  
14              qualifying project.

15              (4) ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE.—Prepare a  
16              unified environmental review document for each  
17              qualifying project application, incorporating a single  
18              environmental record on which all cooperating agen-  
19              cies with authority to issue approvals for a given  
20              qualifying project shall base project approval deci-  
21              sions. Help ensure that cooperating agencies make  
22              necessary decisions, within their respective authori-  
23              ties, regarding Federal approvals in accordance with  
24              the following timelines:

1 (A) Not later than 1 year after acceptance  
2 of a completed project application when an en-  
3 vironmental assessment and finding of no sig-  
4 nificant impact is determined to be the appro-  
5 priate level of review under the National Envi-  
6 ronmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321  
7 et seq.).

8 (B) Not later than 1 year and 30 days  
9 after the close of the public comment period for  
10 a draft environmental impact statement under  
11 the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969  
12 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.), when an environ-  
13 mental impact statement is required under the  
14 same.

15 (5) CONSOLIDATED ADMINISTRATIVE  
16 RECORD.—Maintain a consolidated administrative  
17 record of the information assembled and used by the  
18 cooperating agencies as the basis for agency deci-  
19 sions.

20 (6) PROJECT DATA RECORDS.—To the extent  
21 practicable and consistent with Federal law, ensure  
22 that all project data is submitted and maintained in  
23 generally accessible electronic format, compile, and  
24 where authorized under existing law, make available

1 such project data to cooperating agencies, the quali-  
2 fying project applicant, and to the public.

3 (7) PROJECT MANAGER.—Appoint a project  
4 manager for each qualifying project. The project  
5 manager shall have authority to oversee the project  
6 and to facilitate the issuance of the relevant final  
7 authorizing documents, and shall be responsible for  
8 ensuring fulfillment of all Bureau responsibilities set  
9 forth in this section and all cooperating agency re-  
10 sponsibilities under section 5.

11 **SEC. 6004. COOPERATING AGENCY RESPONSIBILITIES.**

12 (a) ADHERENCE TO BUREAU SCHEDULE.—

13 (1) TIMEFRAMES.—On notification of an appli-  
14 cation for a qualifying project, the head of each co-  
15 operating agency shall submit to the Bureau a time-  
16 frame under which the cooperating agency reason-  
17 ably will be able to complete the authorizing respon-  
18 sibilities of the cooperating agency.

19 (2) SCHEDULE.—

20 (A) USE OF TIMEFRAMES.—The Bureau  
21 shall use the timeframes submitted under this  
22 subsection to establish the project schedule  
23 under section 4.

1 (B) ADHERENCE.—Each cooperating agen-  
2 cy shall adhere to the project schedule estab-  
3 lished by the Bureau under subparagraph (A).

4 (b) ENVIRONMENTAL RECORD.—The head of each  
5 cooperating agency shall submit to the Bureau all environ-  
6 mental review material produced or compiled in the course  
7 of carrying out activities required under Federal law, con-  
8 sistent with the project schedule established by the Bureau  
9 under subsection (a)(2).

10 (c) DATA SUBMISSION.—To the extent practicable  
11 and consistent with Federal law, the head of each cooper-  
12 ating agency shall submit all relevant project data to the  
13 Bureau in a generally accessible electronic format, subject  
14 to the project schedule established by the Bureau under  
15 subsection (a)(2).

16 **SEC. 6005. FUNDING TO PROCESS PERMITS.**

17 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, after public notice  
18 in accordance with subchapter II of chapter 5, and chapter  
19 7, of title 5, United States Code (commonly known as the  
20 “Administrative Procedure Act”), may accept and expend  
21 funds contributed by a non-Federal public entity to expe-  
22 dite the evaluation of a permit of that entity related to  
23 a qualifying project.

24 (b) EFFECT ON PERMITTING.—

1           (1) EVALUATION OF PERMITS.—In carrying out  
2 this section, the Secretary shall ensure that the eval-  
3 uation of permits carried out using funds accepted  
4 under this section shall—

5           (A) be reviewed by the Regional Director  
6 of the Bureau of the region in which the quali-  
7 fying project or activity is located (or a des-  
8 ignee); and

9           (B) use the same procedures for decisions  
10 that would otherwise be required for the evalua-  
11 tion of permits for similar projects or activities  
12 not carried out using funds authorized under  
13 this section.

14          (2) IMPARTIAL DECISIONMAKING.—In carrying  
15 out this section, the Secretary and the head of each  
16 cooperating agency receiving funds under this sec-  
17 tion for a qualifying project shall ensure that the use  
18 of the funds accepted under this section for the  
19 qualifying project shall not—

20           (A) substantively or procedurally impact  
21 impartial decision making with respect to the  
22 issuance of permits; or

23           (B) diminish, modify, or otherwise affect  
24 the statutory or regulatory authorities of the  
25 cooperating agency.

1 (c) LIMITATION ON USE OF FUNDS.—None of the  
2 funds accepted under this section shall be used to carry  
3 out a review of the evaluation of permits required under  
4 subsection (b)(1)(A).

5 (d) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The Secretary shall en-  
6 sure that all final permit decisions carried out using funds  
7 authorized under this section are made available to the  
8 public, including on the Internet.

9 **TITLE VII—FEDERALLY INTE-**  
10 **GRATED SPECIES HEALTH**  
11 **ACT**

12 **SEC. 7001. TRANSFER OF FUNCTIONS WITH RESPECT TO**  
13 **ANADROMOUS SPECIES AND CATADROMOUS**  
14 **SPECIES.**

15 (a) TRANSFER OF FUNCTIONS.—All functions with  
16 respect to anadromous species and catadromous species  
17 under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C.  
18 1531, et seq.) that were vested in the Secretary of Com-  
19 merce or the National Marine Fisheries Service imme-  
20 diately before the enactment of this Act are transferred  
21 to the Secretary of the Interior.

22 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.—The Endangered  
23 Species Act of 1973 is amended—

24 (1) in section 3(15) (16 U.S.C. 1532(15))—

25 (A) by inserting “(A)” after “(15)”; and



1 (B) by adding at the end the following:

2 “(B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A),  
3 with respect to anadromous species and  
4 catadromous species, the term ‘Secretary’  
5 means the Secretary of the Interior.”; and

6 (2) in section 3 (16 U.S.C. 1532) by adding at  
7 the end the following:

8 “(22) The term ‘anadromous species’ means a  
9 species of fish that spawn in fresh or estuarine  
10 waters and that migrate to ocean waters.

11 “(23) The term ‘catadromous species’ means a  
12 species of fish that spawn in ocean waters and mi-  
13 grate to fresh waters.”.

14 **SEC. 7002. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.**

15 (a) REFERENCES.—Any reference in any other Fed-  
16 eral law, Executive order, rule, regulation, or delegation  
17 of authority, or any document of or pertaining to a depart-  
18 ment or office from which a function is transferred by this  
19 Act—

20 (1) to the head of such department or office is  
21 deemed to refer to the Secretary of the Interior; or

22 (2) to such department or office is deemed to  
23 refer to the Department of the Interior.

24 (b) EXERCISE OF AUTHORITIES.—Except as other-  
25 wise provided by law, the Secretary of the Interior may,

1 for purposes of performing the functions transferred by  
2 this Act, exercise all authorities under the Endangered  
3 Species Act of 1973 that were available with respect to  
4 the performance of that function immediately before the  
5 effective date of the transfer of the function under this  
6 Act.

7 (c) SAVINGS PROVISIONS.—

8 (1) LEGAL DOCUMENTS.—All orders, deter-  
9 minations, rules, regulations, permits, grants, loans,  
10 contracts, agreements, certificates, licenses, and  
11 privileges—

12 (A) that have been issued, made, granted,  
13 or allowed to become effective by the Secretary  
14 of Commerce, any officer or employee of the  
15 Department of Commerce, or any other Govern-  
16 ment official in the performance of any function  
17 that is transferred by this Act, or by a court of  
18 competent jurisdiction with respect to such per-  
19 formance; and

20 (B) that are in effect on the effective date  
21 of this Act (or become effective after such date  
22 pursuant to their terms as in effect on such ef-  
23 fective date),

24 shall continue in effect according to their terms until  
25 modified, terminated, superseded, set aside, or re-

1 voked in accordance with law by the President, any  
2 other authorized official, a court of competent juris-  
3 diction, or operation of law.

4 (2) PROCEEDINGS.—

5 (A) IN GENERAL.—This Act shall not af-  
6 fect any proceedings or any application for any  
7 benefits, service, license, permit, certificate, or  
8 financial assistance pending on the date of the  
9 enactment of this Act before an office trans-  
10 ferred by this Act. Such proceedings and appli-  
11 cations shall be continued. Orders shall be  
12 issued in such proceedings, appeals shall be  
13 taken therefrom, and payments shall be made  
14 pursuant to such orders, as if this Act had not  
15 been enacted, and orders issued in any such  
16 proceeding shall continue in effect until modi-  
17 fied, terminated, superseded, or revoked by a  
18 duly authorized official, by a court of competent  
19 jurisdiction, or by operation of law.

20 (B) LIMITATION.—Nothing in this para-  
21 graph shall be considered to prohibit the dis-  
22 continuance or modification of any such pro-  
23 ceeding under the same terms and conditions  
24 and to the same extent that such proceeding

1           could have been discontinued or modified if this  
2           Act had not been enacted.

3           (3) SUITS.—This Act shall not affect suits com-  
4           menced before the date of the enactment of this Act,  
5           and in all such suits, proceeding shall be had, ap-  
6           peals taken, and judgments rendered in the same  
7           manner and with the same effect as if this Act had  
8           not been enacted.

9           (4) NONABATEMENT OF ACTIONS.—No suit, ac-  
10          tion, or other proceeding commenced by or against  
11          the Department of Commerce or the Secretary of  
12          Commerce, or by or against any individual in the of-  
13          ficial capacity of such individual as an officer or em-  
14          ployee of the Department of Commerce, shall abate  
15          by reason of the enactment of this Act.

16          (5) CONTINUANCE OF SUITS.—If any Govern-  
17          ment officer in the official capacity of such officer  
18          is party to a suit with respect to a function of the  
19          officer, and under this Act such function is trans-  
20          ferred to any other officer or office, then such suit  
21          shall be continued with the other officer or the head  
22          of such other office, as applicable, substituted or  
23          added as a party.

24          (6) ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE AND JUDI-  
25          CIAL REVIEW.—Except as otherwise provided by this

1 Act, any statutory requirements relating to notice,  
2 hearings, action upon the record, or administrative  
3 or judicial review that apply to any function trans-  
4 ferred by this Act shall apply to the exercise of such  
5 function by the head of the Federal agency, and  
6 other officers of the agency, to which such function  
7 is transferred by this Act.

8 **SEC. 7003. DEFINITIONS.**

9 In this title:

10 (1) ANADROMOUS SPECIES AND CATADROMOUS  
11 SPECIES.—Each of the terms “anadromous species”  
12 and “catadromous species” has the meaning that  
13 term has under section 3 of the Endangered Species  
14 Act of 1973, as amended by section 3 of this title.

15 (2) FUNCTION.—The term “function” includes  
16 any duty, obligation, power, authority, responsibility,  
17 right, privilege, activity, or program.

18 (3) OFFICE.—The term “office” includes any  
19 office, administration, agency, bureau, institute,  
20 council, unit, organizational entity, or component  
21 thereof.

1 **TITLE VIII—AQUIFER RE-**  
2 **CHARGE FLEXIBILITY PILOT**  
3 **PROGRAM**

4 **SEC. 8001. DEFINITIONS.**

5 In this title:

6 (1) BUREAU.—The term “Bureau” means the  
7 Bureau of Reclamation.

8 (2) COMMISSIONER.—The term “Commis-  
9 sioner” means the Commissioner of Reclamation.

10 (3) ELIGIBLE LAND.—The term “eligible land”,  
11 with respect to a Reclamation project, means land  
12 that—

13 (A) is authorized to receive water under  
14 State law; and

15 (B) shares an aquifer with land located in  
16 the service area of the Reclamation project.

17 (4) NET WATER STORAGE BENEFIT.—The term  
18 “net water storage benefit” means an increase in the  
19 volume of water that is—

20 (A) stored in one or more aquifers; and

21 (B)(i) available for use within the author-  
22 ized service area of a Reclamation project; or

23 (ii) stored on a long-term basis to avoid or  
24 reduce groundwater overdraft.

1           (5) RECLAMATION FACILITY.—The term “Rec-  
2           lamation facility” means each of the infrastructure  
3           assets that are owned by the Bureau at a Reclama-  
4           tion project.

5           (6) RECLAMATION PROJECT.—The term “Rec-  
6           lamation project” means any reclamation or irriga-  
7           tion project, including incidental features thereof,  
8           authorized by Federal reclamation law or the Act of  
9           August 11, 1939 (commonly known as the “Water  
10          Conservation and Utilization Act”) (53 Stat. 1418,  
11          chapter 717; 16 U.S.C. 590y et seq.), or constructed  
12          by the United States pursuant to such law, or in  
13          connection with which there is a repayment or water  
14          service contract executed by the United States pur-  
15          suant to such law, or any project constructed by the  
16          Secretary through the Bureau for the reclamation of  
17          land.

18          (7) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means  
19          the Secretary of the Interior.

20   **SEC. 8002. USE OF BUREAU FACILITIES.**

21          (1) IN GENERAL.—The Commissioner may  
22          allow the use of excess capacity in Reclamation fa-  
23          cilities for aquifer recharge of non-Reclamation  
24          project water, subject to applicable rates, charges,

1 and public participation requirements, on the condi-  
2 tion that—

3 (A) the use—

4 (i) shall not be implemented in a man-  
5 ner that is detrimental to—

6 (I) any power service or water  
7 contract for the Reclamation project;

8 or

9 (II) any obligations for fish, wild-  
10 life, or water quality protection appli-  
11 cable to the Reclamation project;

12 (ii) shall be consistent with water  
13 quality guidelines for the Reclamation  
14 project;

15 (iii) shall comply with all applicable—

16 (I) Federal laws; and

17 (II) policies of the Bureau; and

18 (B) the non-Federal party to an existing  
19 contract for water or water capacity in a Rec-  
20 lamation facility consents to the use of the Rec-  
21 lamation facility under this subsection.

22 (2) EFFECT ON EXISTING CONTRACTS.—Noth-  
23 ing in this subsection affects a contract—

24 (A) in effect on the date of the enactment  
25 of this title; and



1 (B) under which the use of excess capacity  
2 in a Bureau conveyance facility for carriage of  
3 non-Reclamation project water for aquifer re-  
4 charge is allowed.

5 **SEC. 8003. AQUIFER RECHARGE ON ELIGIBLE LAND.**

6 (1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraphs (3)  
7 and (4), the Secretary may contract with a holder of  
8 a water service or repayment contract for a Rec-  
9 lamation project to allow the contractor, in accord-  
10 ance with applicable State laws and policies—

11 (A) to directly use water available under  
12 the contract for aquifer recharge on eligible  
13 land; or

14 (B) to enter into an agreement with an in-  
15 dividual or entity to transfer water available  
16 under the contract for aquifer recharge on eligi-  
17 ble land.

18 (2) AUTHORIZED PROJECT USE.—The use of a  
19 Reclamation facility for aquifer recharge under para-  
20 graph (1) shall be considered an authorized use for  
21 the Reclamation project if requested by a holder of  
22 a water service or repayment contract for the Rec-  
23 lamation facility.

24 (3) MODIFICATIONS TO CONTRACTS.—The Sec-  
25 retary may contract with a holder of a water service

1 or repayment contract for a Reclamation project  
2 under paragraph (1) if the Secretary determines  
3 that a new contract or contract amendment de-  
4 scribed in that paragraph is—

5 (A) necessary to allow for the use of water  
6 available under the contract for aquifer re-  
7 charge under this subsection;

8 (B) in the best interest of the Reclamation  
9 project and the United States; and

10 (C) approved by the contractor that is re-  
11 sponsible for repaying the cost of construction,  
12 operations, and maintenance of the facility that  
13 delivers the water under the contract.

14 (4) REQUIREMENTS.—The use of Reclamation  
15 facilities for the use or transfer of water for aquifer  
16 recharge under this subsection shall be subject to  
17 the requirements that—

18 (A) the use or transfer shall not be imple-  
19 mented in a manner that materially impacts  
20 any power service or water contract for the  
21 Reclamation project; and

22 (B) before the use or transfer, the Sec-  
23 retary shall determine that the use or trans-  
24 fer—

- 1 (i) results in a net water storage ben-  
2 efit for the Reclamation project; or  
3 (ii) contributes to the recharge of an  
4 aquifer on eligible land; and  
5 (C) the use or transfer complies with all  
6 applicable—  
7 (i) Federal laws and policies; and  
8 (ii) interstate water compacts.

9 **SEC. 8004. SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

10 It is the sense of Congress that—

11 (1) the Secretary should encourage the use of  
12 public land administered by the Bureau of Land  
13 Management for aquifer recharge, where appro-  
14 priate, consistent with—

15 (A) the existing grant of right-of-way;

16 (B) as applicable, the Federal Land Policy  
17 and Management Act of 1976 (43 U.S.C. 1701  
18 et seq.); and

19 (C) applicable land and resource manage-  
20 ment plans; and

21 (2) the Secretary should consider whether aqui-  
22 fer recharge may be appropriate in certain areas of  
23 critical environmental concern, if aquifer recharge—

1 (A) would enhance the values for which the  
2 area of critical environmental concern has been  
3 designated; and

4 (B) is consistent with the management re-  
5 quirements for the area of critical environ-  
6 mental concern.

7 **SEC. 8005. CONVEYANCE FOR AQUIFER RECHARGE PUR-**  
8 **POSES.**

9 The holder of a right-of-way, easement, permit, or  
10 other authorization to transport water across public land  
11 administered by the Bureau of Land Management may  
12 transport water for aquifer recharge purposes, including  
13 outside of the regular period of use, without requiring ad-  
14 ditional authorization from the Secretary where the use  
15 does not expand or modify the operation of the right-of-  
16 way, easement, permit, or other authorization across pub-  
17 lic land.

18 **SEC. 8006. REPORT.**

19 No later than 18 months after the enactment of this  
20 law, the Secretary of the Interior shall submit to the Com-  
21 mittee on Natural Resources of the House of Representa-  
22 tives and the Committees on Energy and Natural Re-  
23 sources of the Senate a report that describes the status  
24 of the pilot; and describes obstacles, if any, to imple-  
25 menting the pilot.

1 **SEC. 8007. EFFECT.**

2 Nothing in this Act—

3 (1) creates, impairs, alters, or supersedes a  
4 Federal or State water right; or.

5 (2) alters or supersedes State sovereignty and  
6 authority regarding State water rights and the use  
7 of water.

8 **SEC. 8008. EXEMPTION.**

9 This title shall not apply to the State of California.

10 **TITLE IX—BIG SAND WASH**  
11 **PROJECT TITLE TRANSFER ACT**

12 **SEC. 9001. DEFINITIONS.**

13 In this title:

14 (1) **ACQUIRED LANDS.**—The term “Acquired  
15 Lands” means those lands that were acquired by the  
16 Central Utah Water Conservancy District with Fed-  
17 eral and District funds for the purpose of water  
18 storage and conveyance in the Big Sand Wash Fa-  
19 cilities.

20 (2) **ASSOCIATION.**—The term “Association”  
21 means the Moon Lake Water Users Association, an  
22 association of 8 irrigation companies in Utah.

23 (3) **BIG SAND WASH FACILITIES.**—The term  
24 “Big Sand Wash Facilities”—

25 (A) means the following features that are  
26 part of the Uinta Basin Replacement Project

1 authorized by the Central Utah Project Comple-  
2 tion Act (Public Law 102–575)—

3 (i) the Big Sand Wash Dam, includ-  
4 ing the enlarged reservoir and outlet  
5 works;

6 (ii) the Feeder Pipeline;

7 (iii) the Feeder Diversion;

8 (iv) the Roosevelt Pipeline; and

9 (v) the Big Sand Wash Facilities; and

10 (B) does not include—

11 (i) the Moon Lake Dam and Res-  
12 ervoir; and

13 (ii) the modified outlet works.

14 (4) DISTRICT.—The term “District” means the  
15 Central Utah Water Conservancy District, a political  
16 subdivision of the State of Utah with certain respon-  
17 sibilities for the implementation of the Central Utah  
18 Project Completion Act.

19 (5) DUCHESNE COUNTY.—The term “Duchesne  
20 County” means the Duchesne County Water Conser-  
21 vancy District in Duchesne County, Utah.

22 (6) FEDERAL LANDS.—The term “Federal  
23 Lands” means parcels of federally owned lands and  
24 easements acquired for the expansion of the Big  
25 Sand Wash Facilities, and includes those original,

1 Association lands deeded to the United States in No-  
2 vember 2001 as a permanent easement for the con-  
3 veyance and storage of water and the right of in-  
4 gress and egress.

5 (7) FEEDER DIVERSION.—The term “Feeder  
6 Diversion” means the diversion structure and appur-  
7 tenances constructed in the Lake Fork River to di-  
8 vert water into the Big Sand Wash Project, and in-  
9 cludes the property acquired by easement for the di-  
10 version structure and rights of egress and ingress to  
11 the property.

12 (8) FEEDER PIPELINE.—The term “Feeder  
13 Pipeline” means the pipeline and appurtenances con-  
14 structed from the Feeder Diversion to the Big Sand  
15 Wash Reservoir, and includes the property acquired  
16 by easement for the pipeline.

17 (9) ROOSEVELT PIPELINE.—The term “Roo-  
18 sevelt Pipeline” means the pipeline and appur-  
19 tenances constructed to deliver project and non-  
20 project water from the Big Sand Wash Facilities for  
21 the Association and Duchesne County, and includes  
22 the property acquired by easement for the pipeline.

23 (10) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary”  
24 means the Secretary of the Interior or a designee of  
25 the Secretary.

1           (11) UINTA BASIN REPLACEMENT PROJECT.—  
2           The term “Uinta Basin Replacement Project” ap-  
3           plies to the project that was authorized by the Cen-  
4           tral Utah Project Completion Act to enlarge the Big  
5           Sand Wash Dam and Reservoir, construct the Feed-  
6           er Diversion, construct the Feeder Pipeline, con-  
7           struct the Roosevelt Pipeline, modify the Moon Lake  
8           outlet works, develop mitigation lands, and develop  
9           other facilities as required to complete project pur-  
10          poses.

11 **SEC. 9002. CONVEYANCE OF FACILITIES AND LAND.**

12          (a) IN GENERAL.—Subject to subsection (b) and in  
13          consideration of the District assuming from the United  
14          States all liability for administration, operation, and main-  
15          tenance of the Big Sand Wash Facilities, the Secretary  
16          shall convey to the District all right, title, and interest  
17          of the United States in and to the Acquired Lands, the  
18          Federal Lands, and the Big Sand Wash Facilities in exist-  
19          ence on the date of the enactment of this Title.

20          (b) CONDITIONS.—The conveyance under subsection  
21          (a) shall not be completed until all of the following occur:

22                (1) The District pays to the Secretary the net  
23                present value of the remaining repayment obliga-  
24                tions identified in the Water Service Contract, Sup-  
25                plement No. 2, Contract No. 14–06–400–4286 and



1 Block Notice Number UBRP1, as determined by Of-  
2 fice of Management and Budget Circular A-129 (in  
3 effect on the date of the enactment of this title).  
4 Such prepayment shall not affect the contract to de-  
5 liver water between the District and Duchesne Coun-  
6 ty and shall remedy all outstanding issues relating  
7 to the District's expenditure of Federal funds for  
8 land acquisition.

9 (2) The Association, the District, and Duchesne  
10 County enter into an agreement, only as mutually  
11 deemed necessary by the Parties, reflecting as much  
12 as possible the existing operating agreement, Agree-  
13 ment No. 01-07-40-R7020 dated November 15,  
14 2001, that provides for the future operation of and  
15 delivery of water from the Big Sand Wash Facilities.

16 (3) The Association and the District enter into  
17 an agreement to convey Acquired Lands, Federal  
18 Lands, the Feeder Diversion, and the Feeder Pipe-  
19 line to the Association.

20 (4) The Association and the District enter into  
21 an agreement that ensures the minimum stream flow  
22 requirements contained in the Final Environmental  
23 Assessment, section 203(a), Uinta Basin Replace-  
24 ment Project, dated October 2001.

1           (5) The District and the United States enter  
2           into an agreement that ensures the minimum stream  
3           flow requirements contained in the Final Environ-  
4           mental Assessment, section 203(a), Uinta Basin Re-  
5           placement Project, dated October 2001.

6           (6) The District enters into an agreement to  
7           convey Acquired Lands and Federal Lands to the  
8           Utah Department of Transportation.

9           (7) The District enters into an agreement to  
10          convey the Roosevelt Pipeline to Duchesne County.

11          (c) PREPAYMENT AUTHORITY.—The District is here-  
12          by granted authority to prepay, at net present value as  
13          determined by Office of Management and Budget Circular  
14          A-129 (as in effect on the date of the enactment of this  
15          title), all irrigation block notices associated with the Bon-  
16          neville Unit of the Central Utah Project.

17          (d) PAYMENT OF COSTS.—The District shall pay any  
18          necessary and reasonable administrative and real estate  
19          transfer costs incurred by the Secretary in carrying out  
20          the conveyance authorized by subsection (a).

21          (e) COMPLIANCE WITH ENVIRONMENTAL LAWS.—

22                  (1) IN GENERAL.—Before conveying land and  
23                  facilities under subsection (a), the Secretary shall  
24                  comply with all applicable requirements under—

1 (A) the National Environmental Policy Act  
2 of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.);

3 (B) the Endangered Species Act of 1973  
4 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.); and

5 (C) any other law applicable to the land  
6 and facilities.

7 (2) EFFECT.—Nothing in this title modifies or  
8 alters any obligations under—

9 (A) the National Environmental Policy Act  
10 of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.); or

11 (B) the Endangered Species Act of 1973  
12 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.).

13 **SEC. 9003. RELATIONSHIP TO UINTA BASIN REPLACEMENT**  
14 **PROJECT.**

15 After the conveyance authorized under section 3(a),  
16 the United States shall not be liable for damages arising  
17 out of any act, omission, or occurrence relating to the Big  
18 Sand Wash Facilities, Acquired Lands, and Federal  
19 Lands, except for damages caused by acts of negligence  
20 committed by the United States or by any employee or  
21 agent of the United States before the date of the convey-  
22 ance, consistent with chapter 171 of title 28, United  
23 States Code.

1 **SEC. 9004. REPORT.**

2 If the conveyance authorized by section 3(a) is not  
3 completed by the date that is 12 months after the date  
4 of the enactment of this Title, the Secretary shall submit  
5 to Congress a report that—

6 (1) describes the status of the conveyance;

7 (2) describes any obstacles to completing the  
8 conveyance; and

9 (3) specifies an anticipated date for completion  
10 of the conveyance.

11 **TITLE X—KENNEWICK IRRIGA-**  
12 **TION DISTRICT TITLE TRANS-**  
13 **FER ACT**

14 **SEC. 10001. DEFINITIONS.**

15 In this title:

16 (1) **AGREEMENT.**—The term “Agreement”  
17 means the agreement required under section 2(a).

18 (2) **DISTRICT.**—The term “District” means the  
19 Kennewick Irrigation District, located in Benton  
20 County, Washington, which operates and maintains  
21 a portion of the Kennewick Division of the Yakima  
22 Project constructed by the United States to enable  
23 the Kennewick Irrigation District to carry out au-  
24 thorized purposes pursuant to the Act of June 12,  
25 1948 (62 Stat. 382).

1           (3) DISTRICT'S HEAD GATE.—The term “Dis-  
2        trict's head gate” means the point of diversion for  
3        the Kennewick Irrigation District, identified as the  
4        KID Main Canal Headworks at the following loca-  
5        tion: KID Main Canal Headworks, 200 feet east and  
6        1100 feet north, more or less, from the southwest  
7        corner of section 16, being within the northwest  $\frac{1}{4}$   
8        of the southwest  $\frac{1}{4}$  of the southwest  $\frac{1}{4}$  of section  
9        16, T. 9 N., 26 E.W.M.

10           (4) DIVISION.—The term “Division” means the  
11        Kennewick Division, including the Transferred  
12        Works.

13           (5) TRANSFERRED WORKS.—The term “Trans-  
14        ferred Works” means the canals, laterals, and ap-  
15        purtenant works and lands, which begin at the Dis-  
16        trict's head gate and extends approximately 40 miles  
17        east to the Columbia River built to serve the place  
18        of use of the 20,201 acres of currently irrigated irri-  
19        gable lands entitled to delivery of water within the  
20        Kennewick Irrigation District.

21           (6) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means  
22        the Secretary of the Interior.

23   **SEC. 10002. AGREEMENT, CONVEYANCE, REPORT.**

24           (a) AGREEMENT.—Not later than 2 years after the  
25        date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary, acting

1 through the Bureau of Reclamation, shall enter into an  
2 agreement with the District to determine the legal, institu-  
3 tional, and financial terms related to the conveyance of  
4 the Transferred Works. The Agreement shall be completed  
5 after the requirements in section 5(a) are satisfied. This  
6 Agreement shall be in accordance with and subject to  
7 Memorandum of Agreement No: R18MA13703 between  
8 the District and the Bureau of Reclamation.

9 (b) CONVEYANCE.—Subject to valid leases, permits,  
10 rights-of-way, easements, and other existing rights and in  
11 accordance the terms and conditions set forth in the  
12 Agreement and this Act, the Secretary shall convey to the  
13 District all right, title, and interest of the United States  
14 in and to the Transferred Works.

15 (c) REPORT.—If the conveyance authorized by sub-  
16 section (b) is not completed within 2 years after the date  
17 of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall submit  
18 to Congress a report that—

- 19 (1) describes the status of the conveyance;
- 20 (2) describes any obstacles to completing the  
21 conveyance; and
- 22 (3) specifies an anticipated date for completion  
23 of the conveyance.

1 **SEC. 10003. LIABILITY.**

2 (a) DAMAGES.—Except as otherwise provided by law  
3 and for damages caused by acts of negligence committed  
4 by the United States or by its employees or agents, effec-  
5 tive upon the date of the conveyance authorized by section  
6 2, the United States shall not be held liable by any court  
7 for damages of any kind arising out of any act, omission,  
8 or occurrence relating to the Transferred Works.

9 (b) TORTS CLAIMS.—Nothing in this section in-  
10 creases the liability of the United States beyond that pro-  
11 vided in chapter 171 of title 28, United States Code (pop-  
12 ularly known as the “Federal Tort Claims Act”).

13 **SEC. 10004. BENEFITS.**

14 (a) STATUS OF LAND.—After conveyance of the  
15 Transferred Works under this Act, the Transferred Works  
16 shall not be considered to be a part of a Federal reclama-  
17 tion project.

18 (b) BENEFITS IF ENTIRE DIVISION CONVEYED.—If  
19 the entire Division is conveyed out of Federal ownership,  
20 the District shall not be eligible to receive any benefits,  
21 including project power, with respect to the conveyed Divi-  
22 sion, except benefits that would be available to a similarly  
23 situated entity with respect to property that is not part  
24 of a Federal reclamation project.

1 **SEC. 10005. COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER LAWS.**

2 (a) COMPLIANCE WITH ENVIRONMENTAL AND HIS-  
3 TORIC PRESERVATION LAWS.—Before making the convey-  
4 ance authorized by this Act, the Secretary shall complete  
5 all actions required under the National Environmental  
6 Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.), the Endan-  
7 gered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.), sub-  
8 title III of title 54, United States Code, and all other ap-  
9 plicable laws.

10 (b) COMPLIANCE BY THE DISTRICT.—After convey-  
11 ance of the Transferred Works under this Act, the District  
12 shall comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local  
13 laws and regulations in its operation of the Transferred  
14 Works.

15 (c) APPLICABLE AUTHORITY.—All provisions of Fed-  
16 eral reclamation law (the Act of June 17, 1902 (43 U.S.C.  
17 371 et seq.), and Acts supplemental to and amendatory  
18 of that Act) shall continue to be applicable to project water  
19 provided to the District.

20 **SEC. 10006. PAYMENT.**

21 (a) ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS.—Except as provided in  
22 subsection (b), administrative costs for conveyance of the  
23 Transferred Works under this Act shall be paid in equal  
24 shares by the Secretary and the District.

25 (b) REAL ESTATE TRANSFER COST.—Costs of all  
26 boundary surveys, title searches, cadastral surveys, ap-



1 praisals, and other real estate transactions required for  
2 the conveyance of the Transferred Works shall be paid by  
3 the District.

4 (c) COSTS OF COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER LAWS.—  
5 Costs associated with any review required under the Na-  
6 tional Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C.  
7 4321et seq.), the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16  
8 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.), subtitle III of title 54, United States  
9 Code, and all other applicable laws for conveyance of the  
10 Transferred Works shall be paid in equal shares by the  
11 Secretary and the District.

12 **SEC. 10007. MISCELLANEOUS.**

13 (a) APPLICABILITY OF OTHER LAW.—Section 1212  
14 of Public Law 103–434 shall apply to and be incorporated  
15 into this Act.

16 (b) STATUTORY CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this  
17 Act shall or shall be construed for any purpose—

18 (1) to transfer, affect, reduce, modify, or impair  
19 the water rights of any person;

20 (2) to affect, reduce, modify, or impair the  
21 United States authority to regulate and manage  
22 water in the Yakima Basin, including water diverted  
23 into the Chandler Power Canal and Prosser Dam  
24 through and including the Kennewick Irrigation Dis-  
25 trict’s head gate;

1           (3) to change how water is diverted at Prosser  
2 Dam and delivered to the Kennewick Irrigation Dis-  
3 trict through the Chandler pumps through the Dis-  
4 trict's head gate; and

5           (4) to affect, reduce, modify, or impair the  
6 United States control, management, and ownership  
7 of the "Reserved works" as defined in the United  
8 States Bureau of Reclamation and Kennewick Irri-  
9 gation District Amendatory Repayment Contract  
10 (1953) (Contract No. 14-06-W-56) as amended, at  
11 pp. 2-3, which Reserved works include but are not  
12 limited to Prosser Dam, the Chandler Power Canal  
13 and hydroelectric and pumping plant, all Yakima  
14 Project facilities, and the siphon under the Yakima  
15 River to the District's head gate.

16 **SEC. 10008. LIMITATIONS.**

17       After completing the requirements of the National  
18 Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et  
19 seq.), the Secretary of the Interior shall convey title, if  
20 the Secretary affirms in writing to the House Committee  
21 on Natural Resources and the Senate Committee on En-  
22 ergy and Natural Resources that the following criteria  
23 have been met:

24           (1) The Kennewick Irrigation District agrees to  
25 accept title to the property proposed for transfer.

1           (2) The proposed title transfer will not have an  
2           unmitigated negative effect on the environment.

3           (3) The transfer is consistent with the Sec-  
4           retary's responsibility to protect land and water re-  
5           sources held in trust for federally recognized Indian  
6           Tribes.

7           (4) The transfer is consistent with the Sec-  
8           retary's responsibility to ensure compliance with  
9           international treaties and interstate compacts.

10          (5) The Kennewick Irrigation District agrees to  
11          provide, as consideration for the assets to be con-  
12          veyed, compensation to the United States worth the  
13          equivalent of the present value of any repayment ob-  
14          ligation to the United States or other income stream  
15          the United States derives from the assets to be  
16          transferred at the time of the transfer.

17                   **TITLE XI—WATER RIGHTS**  
18                   **PROTECTION ACT**

19   **SEC. 11001. DEFINITIONS.**

20           In this title:

21           (1)   **SECRETARY.**—The term “Secretary”  
22           means, as applicable—

23                   (A) the Secretary of Agriculture; or

24                   (B) the Secretary of the Interior.

1           (2) WATER RIGHT.—The term “water right”  
2 means any surface, groundwater, or storage use  
3 filed, permitted, certificated, confirmed, decreed, ad-  
4 judicated, or otherwise recognized by a judicial pro-  
5 ceeding or by the State in which the user acquires  
6 possession of the water or puts it to beneficial use.  
7 Such term shall include water rights for federally  
8 recognized Indian Tribes.

9 **SEC. 11002. TREATMENT OF WATER RIGHTS.**

10 The Secretary shall not—

11           (1) condition the issuance, renewal, amendment,  
12 or extension of any permit, approval, license, lease,  
13 allotment, easement, right-of-way, or other land use  
14 or occupancy agreement on the transfer of any water  
15 right (including joint and sole ownership) directly or  
16 indirectly to the United States, or on any impair-  
17 ment of title or interest, in whole or in part, granted  
18 or otherwise recognized under State law, by Federal  
19 or State adjudication, decree, or other judgment, or  
20 pursuant to any interstate water compact; or

21           (2) require any water user (including any feder-  
22 ally recognized Indian Tribe) to apply for or acquire  
23 a water right in the name of the United States  
24 under State law as a condition of the issuance, re-  
25 newal, amendment, or extension of any permit, ap-

1       proval, license, lease, allotment, easement, right-of-  
2       way, or other land use or occupancy agreement.

3       **SEC. 11003. POLICY DEVELOPMENT.**

4       In developing any rule, policy, directive, management  
5       plan, or similar Federal action relating to the issuance,  
6       renewal, amendment, or extension of any permit, approval,  
7       license, lease, allotment, easement, right-of-way, or other  
8       land use or occupancy agreement, the Secretary—

9               (1) shall—

10                       (A) recognize the longstanding authority of  
11                       the States relating to evaluating, protecting, al-  
12                       locating, regulating, permitting, and adjudi-  
13                       cating water use; and

14                       (B) coordinate with the States to ensure  
15                       that any rule, policy, directive, management  
16                       plan, or similar Federal action is consistent  
17                       with, and imposes no greater restriction or reg-  
18                       ulatory requirement, than applicable State  
19                       water law; and

20               (2) shall not—

21                       (A) adversely affect—

22                               (i) the authority of a State in—

23                                       (I) permitting the beneficial use  
24                                       of water; or

25                                       (II) adjudicating water rights;

1 (ii) any definition established by a  
2 State with respect to the term “beneficial  
3 use”, “priority of water rights”, or “terms  
4 of use”; or

5 (iii) any other right or obligation of a  
6 State established under State law; or

7 (B) assert any connection between surface  
8 and groundwater that is inconsistent with such  
9 a connection recognized by State water laws.

10 **SEC. 11004. EFFECT.**

11 (a) **EXISTING AUTHORITY.**—Nothing in this Act lim-  
12 its or expands any existing legally recognized authority of  
13 the Secretary to issue, grant, or condition any permit, ap-  
14 proval, license, lease, allotment, easement, right-of-way, or  
15 other land use or occupancy agreement on Federal land  
16 that is subject to the jurisdiction of the Secretary.

17 (b) **RECLAMATION CONTRACTS.**—Nothing in this Act  
18 in any way interferes with any existing or future Bureau  
19 of Reclamation contract entered into pursuant to Federal  
20 reclamation law (the Act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 388,  
21 chapter 1093), and Acts supplemental to and amendatory  
22 of that Act).

23 (c) **ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT.**—Nothing in this  
24 Act affects the implementation of the Endangered Species  
25 Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.).

1 (d) FEDERAL RESERVED WATER RIGHTS.—Nothing  
2 in this Act limits or expands any existing reserved water  
3 rights of the Federal Government on land administered  
4 by the Secretary.

5 (e) FEDERAL POWER ACT.—Nothing in this Act lim-  
6 its or expands authorities pursuant to section 4(e), 10(j),  
7 or 18 of the Federal Power Act (16 U.S.C. 797(e), 803(j),  
8 811).

9 (f) INDIAN WATER RIGHTS.—Nothing in this Act  
10 limits or expands any existing reserved water right or trea-  
11 ty right of any federally recognized Indian Tribe.

12 (g) FEDERALLY HELD STATE WATER RIGHTS.—  
13 Nothing in this Act limits the ability of the Secretary,  
14 through applicable State procedures, to acquire, use, en-  
15 force, or protect a State water right owned by the United  
16 States.

17 **TITLE XII—COULEE DAM**  
18 **REDESIGNATION**

19 **SEC. 12001. REDESIGNATION OF FACILITY.**

20 The facility of the Bureau of Reclamation located at  
21 Highway-155, Coulee Dam, WA 99116, known as the  
22 Third Powerplant, shall be known and designated as the  
23 “Nathaniel ‘Nat’ Washington Power Plant”.

1 **SEC. 12002. REFERENCES.**

2 Any reference in a law, map, regulation, document,  
3 paper or other record of the United States to the facility  
4 referred to in section 1 shall be deemed to be a reference  
5 to the Nathaniel “Nat” Washington Power Plant.

6 **TITLE XIII—NUTRIA ERADI-**  
7 **CATION AND CONTROL ACT**  
8 **REAUTHORIZATION**

9 **SEC. 13001. NUTRIA ERADICATION.**

10 The Nutria Eradication and Control Act of 2003  
11 (Public Law 108–16) is amended—

12 (1) in section 2—

13 (A) in subsection (a)—

14 (i) in paragraph (1), by striking  
15 “Wetlands and tidal marshes of the Chesapeake Bay and in Louisiana” and inserting  
16 “Wetlands, tidal marshes, and agricultural  
17 lands”; and  
18

19 (ii) in paragraph (2), by striking “in  
20 Maryland and Louisiana”;

21 (iii) in paragraph (3), by striking “in  
22 Maryland” and all that follows to the pe-  
23 riod and inserting “Consequently, marsh  
24 loss, loss of public and private wetlands,  
25 and loss of agricultural lands are accel-  
26 erating.”; and



1 (B) in subsection (b), by striking “the  
2 State of Maryland and the State of Louisiana”  
3 and inserting “any state that has demonstrated  
4 the need”; and  
5 (2) in section 3—

6 (A) by amending subsection (a) to read as  
7 follows:

8 “(a) GRANT AUTHORITY.—The Secretary of the Inte-  
9 rior (referred to in this Act as the ‘Secretary’), subject  
10 to the availability of appropriations, may provide financial  
11 assistance to any state that has demonstrated to the Sec-  
12 retary sufficient need for a program to implement meas-  
13 ures to eradicate or control nutria and restore marshland,  
14 public and private wetlands, and agricultural lands dam-  
15 aged by nutria.”;

16 (B) by amending subsection (b) to read as  
17 follows:

18 “(b) GOALS.—The goals of the program shall be to—

19 “(1) eradicate or control nutria in affected  
20 States;

21 “(2) restore marshland, public and private wet-  
22 lands, and agricultural lands damaged by nutria.”;

23 and

24 (C) in subsection (f), by striking  
25 “\$4,000,000” and all that follows and inserting

1           “12,000,000 for any qualifying state program  
2           for each of fiscal years 2021 through 2025.”.

3 **SEC. 13002. DEAUTHORIZATIONS.**

4           The following projects authorized by section 1638 of  
5 the Reclamation Projects Authorization and Adjustment  
6 Act of 1992 (43 U.S.C. 390h-20; Public Law 102–575)  
7 are hereby deauthorized:

- 8           (1) Kalaeloa Seawater Desalination Project.  
9           (2) Lahaina Water Recycling Project #3.  
10          (3) Kealakehe Water Recycling Project.
